## Some Descendants of James Maddray of Isle of Wight County, Virginia and Thomas Ward of Surry County, Virginia

Maddray, Maddry, and Madera were very uncommon last names in Colonial Virginia. Those spellings and a number of similar variations were found only in a small area of the Colony of Virginia before 1750. Immigrant James<sup>1</sup> Maddray arrived sometime in the 1670s and set up residence in Isle of Wight County. His oldest son James and many of his Isle of Wight County descendants did not appear much in the records. His other known son Zachariah migrated to neighboring Surry County and the documents on his descendants are much more plentiful.

For the most part, the spelling variations of the Maddray family name fit into two groups. The Isle of Wight County group commonly spelled the name Maddray or Maddry. The Surry County branch of this family primarily spelled their name Madera in the records. For the purpose of conformity, the name Maddray will be used for all the descendants of James<sup>1</sup>.

The Ward family became neighbors to the Isle of Wight Maddray family just after 1700. A granddaughter of James<sup>1</sup> married into the Ward family. Both Maddray and Ward families are linked in a number of ways over time and both these families will be traced in this paper. The emphasis will be placed on those individuals who relocated to what is now Warren County, North Carolina.

**1. James**<sup>*t*</sup> **Maddray** was born about 1662 in England and died in Isle of Wight County. James married **Jane** (---) about 1686 in Isle of Wight County. Jane was born about 1665 probably in England and died after 1708 in Isle of Wight County.<sup>[1]</sup>

James<sup>1</sup> Maddray showed up in the records for the first time in the mid-1670s when he signed a petition showing his loyalty to the Crown during Bacon's Rebellion.<sup>[2]</sup> James was owed money in the estate of William Taylor on 20 Nov 1677.<sup>[3]</sup> He could have been the headright called James Madro claimed by Thomas Parnell of Isle of Wight County on 20 Apr 1680.<sup>[4]</sup> He purchased from John Murray and wife Elizabeth 100 acres in the upper parish of Isle of Wight County adjoining Thomas Tooke on 20 Jan 1680/81.<sup>[5]</sup> In 1686, he owed 405 pounds of tobacco to the estate of Joseph

Bridgers.<sup>[6]</sup> Wife Jane showed up in the records only in the estate of William Brown in 1709.<sup>[7]</sup> His two known children, James and Zachariah, were not connected directly to him in any record. His son James<sup>2</sup> did inherit his property. However, these two persons were the only individuals with the Maddray name in the area.

Children from James Maddray and wife Jane (---) were:

- 2 M i. **James**<sup>2</sup> **Maddray** was born about 1688 in Isle of Wight County and died before 30 Nov 1727 in Isle of Wight County.
- 3 M ii. **Zachariah**<sup>2</sup> **Maddray** was born about 1689 in Isle of Wight County and died after 4 Mar 1747/48 in Surry County.

**2.** James<sup>2</sup> Maddray (*James*<sup>'</sup>) was born about 1688 in Isle of Wight County and died before 30 Nov 1727 in Isle of Wight County.<sup>[8]</sup> James married Mary (---) about 1718 in Isle of Wight County. Mary was born about 1697 in Isle of Wight County and died after 30 Nov 1727 in Isle of Wight County.

Like his father, James showed up only a couple of times in the records. James inherited the property owned by his father near the First Swamp of the Blackwater River. He was owed money in the estate of William Browne in 1709.<sup>[9]</sup> On 30 Dec 1712, he was a witness to the will of Peter Deberry.<sup>[10]</sup> In 1720, James also witnessed the will of neighbor Edward Brantley.<sup>[11]</sup> He and wife Mary are mentioned in the will of Richard Gray on 21 Oct 1722.<sup>[12]</sup> James was deceased by 30 Nov 1727 when Mary was called Widow Maddray in the will of James Sampson.<sup>[13]</sup>

James was not known to have left a will or an estate. He is believed to be the father of the three Maddrays living in Isle of Wight County in the 1740s.

Children from James Maddray and wife Mary (---) were:

4 M i. **Joseph<sup>3</sup> Maddray** was born about 1723 in Isle of Wight County and died after 26 Feb 1777 in Isle of Wight County.

James' brother Zachariah. James<sup>2</sup> and Zachariah<sup>2</sup> were both mentioned in this record.

- 5 M ii. **Richard<sup>3</sup> Maddray** was born about 1726 in Isle of Wight County and died before 25 May 1812 in Warren County, North Carolina.
- 6 M iii. **James<sup>3</sup> Maddray** was born about 1726 in Isle of Wight County and died before 1760 in Granville County, North Carolina.

**3.** Zachariah<sup>2</sup> Maddray (*James<sup>1</sup>*) was born about 1689 in Isle of Wight County and died after 4 Mar 1747/48 in Surry County.<sup>[14]</sup> Zachariah married **Priscilla Deberry**, daughter of **Peter Deberry** and **Mary Brantley**, about 1710 in Isle of Wight County. Priscilla was born about 1691 in Surry County and died before 1725 in Surry County. Zachariah next married **Joanna Hurdle**, daughter of **William Hurdle** and **Elizabeth** (---), about 1724 in Surry County. Joanna was born about 1691 in Surry County and died after 1781 in Surry County.

Zachariah first appeared in the records in Isle of Wight County in the will of father-in-law Peter Deberry on 30 Dec 1712.<sup>[15]</sup> His wife Priscilla was also mentioned in the will. Priscilla was given 50 acres of land in Surry County where she and her husband were then living, along with other items. On 18 Aug 1715, Zachariah was a witness in Surry County to a land transaction from Joseph and John High to Ethelred Taylor.<sup>[16]</sup> That same day he was sworn in as a justice of the peace and assigned to value the estate of John Bynam.<sup>[17]</sup> He witnessed a land transaction between Samuel Thompson and wife Mary to James Nichols on 14 Apr 1719.<sup>[18]</sup> On 18 Feb 1718/19, Zachariah and wife Priscilla witnessed the will of neighbor Nicholas Smith.<sup>[19]</sup>

Zachariah purchased 100 acres of land on Pidgeon Swamp from William Deloach and wife Helen on 15 Apr 1723.<sup>[20]</sup> He and William Smith also bought 50 acres on Wareneck Mill Swamp from brotherin-law John Deberry on 10 Feb 1724.<sup>[21]</sup> He then purchased two more tracts on Pigeon Swamp. The first purchase was from John Mangum and wife Sarah for 100 acres on 16 Feb 1742/43<sup>[22]</sup> followed by one from Samuel Smith of Isle of Wight County for 100 acres on 15 Feb 1743/44.<sup>[23]</sup> He was also

found in the estate records of Mary Davidson recorded on 17 Sep 1739,<sup>[24]</sup> Henry Savage dated 15 Jul 1741,<sup>[25]</sup> and Edward Long dated 21 Nov 1749.<sup>[26]</sup>

Zachariah married secondly Joanna Hurdle before 12 Apr 1727.<sup>[27]</sup> On that date, she was mentioned in the will of father William Hurdle as Joanna Maddray. She was given money in the will of mother Elizabeth (---) Hurdle on 6 May 1747.<sup>[28]</sup> She was given slaves, use of Zachariah's land, and the remainder of his estate in his will dated 4 Mar 1747/8.<sup>[29]</sup>

Joanna lived 35 years after the death of Zachariah and was mentioned in the records on many occasions. Joanna was a witness in court for son-in-law Edward Bailey on 18 May 1759.<sup>[30]</sup> She was taken to court on two occasions by her children as they attempted to obtain their portion of their father's estate. For instance, four of her children took her to chancery court to obtain their inheritance on 18 Apr 1769.<sup>[31]</sup> Joanna went to court on 23 Apr 1782 to get a slave exempted from being taxed.<sup>[32]</sup> She owned 100 acres in 1782.<sup>[33]</sup> Her son Joel was given responsibility for her estate on 24 Feb 1784.<sup>[34]</sup> Joanna was in the 1782 Virginia Census<sup>[35]</sup> but not the 1784 Census.

Zachariah left a will dated 4 Mar 1748/49. He died closer to Jan 1752 because his will was recorded on 18 Feb 1752.<sup>[36]</sup>

Zachariah had thirteen children and lived on the same neighborhood in Surry County all his adult life time. There are several neighboring families that both marry into his family and were frequently mentioned on documents dealing with them as well. Some of these families include Thomas Warren, William Smith, Thomas Edwards, and the Thomas Davis families.

Zachariah had three children who died previous to his will. Two children are represented in his will by bequests to one of their orphan children instead. The identification of the third child comes from the details of the estate of John Slade recorded on 20 Jan 1767.<sup>[37]</sup>

Children from the marriage of Zachariah Maddray and Priscilla Deberry were:

- 7 M i. **Peter<sup>3</sup> Maddray** was born about 1716 in Surry County and died about 1749 in Surry County.
- 8 M ii. Miss<sup>3</sup> Maddray was born about 1718 in Surry County and died about 1747 in Surry County.
- 9 M iii. **Mr.<sup>3</sup> Maddray** was born about 1719 in Surry County and died about 1744 in Surry County.
- 10 M iv. **James**<sup>3</sup> **Maddray** was born about 1720 in Surry County and died after 22 Apr 1783 in Northampton County, North Carolina.
  - F v. **Priscilla<sup>3</sup> Maddray** was born about 1722 in Surry County. She was mentioned only in the will of her father and given a slave and furniture on 4 Mar 1747/48.<sup>[38]</sup>

Children from the marriage of Zachariah Maddray and Johanna Hurdle were:

- 11 M i. **John<sup>3</sup> Maddray** was born about 1725 in Surry County and died after 20 Jul 1782 in Surry County.
- 12 M ii. **William<sup>3</sup> Maddray** was born about 1726 in Surry County and died after 25 Jun 1772 in Surry County.
  - F iii. Elizabeth<sup>3</sup> Maddray was born about 1727 in Surry County and died by 18 Apr 1769 in Surry County.<sup>[39]</sup> She was mentioned only in the will of her father and given a slave.<sup>[40]</sup> She was not part of the lawsuit against her mother brought by her siblings so she was probably dead by 18 Apr 1769.
  - F iv. Martha<sup>3</sup> Maddray was born about 1728 in Surry County and died before 18 Apr 1769 in Surry County. She was mentioned only in the will of her father and given a slave and money on 4 Mar 1747/48.<sup>[41]</sup> Likewise, she was not a party to the 18 Apr 1769 lawsuit.
- 13 F v. Ann<sup>3</sup> Maddray was born about 1730 in Surry County and died before 1778 in Surry County.
- 14 F vi. **Sarah<sup>3</sup> Maddray** was born about 1731 in Surry County and died before Jul 1763 in Surry County.
- 15 M vii. **Joel<sup>3</sup> Maddray** was born about 1733 in Surry County and died in Dec 1801 in Surry County.
- 16 F viii. **Lucy<sup>3</sup> Maddray** was born about 1735 in Surry County and died after 18 Apr 1769 in Surry County.

**4.** Joseph<sup>3</sup> Maddray (*James*<sup>2</sup>, *James*<sup>1</sup>) was born about 1723 in Isle of Wight County and died after 26 Feb 1777 in Isle of Wight County.<sup>[42]</sup> Joseph married Sarah (---) about 1748 in Isle of

Wight County. Sarah was born about 1725 in Isle of Wight County and died after 26 Feb 1777 in Isle of Wight County.

Joseph was the only one of his siblings to remain in Isle of Wight County his entire life. He was probably the oldest child because he owned the property purchased by his Grandfather James Maddray in 1680/81. Joseph showed up for the first time purchasing from Seth Hunter and wife Mary 100 acres on the east side of Pointers Branch adjoining John Meacum, James Tooke Scott, and others on 3 Apr 1753.<sup>[43]</sup> The neighboring property used to be owned by members of the Brantley Family on 6 Feb 1755.<sup>[44]</sup> In Oct 1755, he owned land in the Newport Parish of Isle of Wight County.<sup>[45]</sup> Joseph and **31. Francis Ward** witnessed a land transaction from Anthony Crocker to William Jordan about 1763.<sup>[46]</sup> He also bought 100 acres of neighboring property from Benjamin Jones on 5 May 1763.<sup>[47]</sup> On 5 Jan 1764, he sold 34 acres to John Jordan.<sup>[48]</sup> Joseph wrote his will on 26 Feb 1777. Sarah received a bequest in the will of her husband.

**5. Richard**<sup>3</sup> **Maddray** (*James*<sup>2</sup>, *James*<sup>1</sup>) was born about 1726 in Isle of Wight County and died before 25 May 1812 in Warren County.<sup>[49]</sup> Richard married **Miss Bobbitt**, daughter of **Lewis Bobbitt** and **Elizabeth Moore**, about 1753 in Granville County.

Richard was in Granville County by 1749 when he appeared on a taxable list.<sup>[50]</sup> Richard owned property near his brother James in Jan 1759.<sup>[51]</sup> Richard was security for sister-in-law Anne (Ward) Maddray in the estate of his brother James Maddray dated 12 Aug 1760.<sup>[52]</sup> He and William Bobbitt provided security for relative Elizabeth Moore for the estate of her husband Robert Moore dated 20 Nov 1764.<sup>[53]</sup>

Richard purchased two patents in Granville County. The first was for 700 acres on 9 Mar 1761 on south side of Reedy Creek and the other for 360 acres on Possum Quarter Creek on 1 Mar 1762.<sup>[54]</sup> On 5 May 1761, his father-in-law Lewis Bobbitt gave to Richard Maddray "in consideration for the

Natural love & Affection he beareth" 200 acres on Reedy Creek adjoining his other land.<sup>[55]</sup> Richard purchased 200 acres from John Hicks on 9 Feb 1768.<sup>[56]</sup> Richard sold to Joshua Capps 240 acres on Lick Branch dated 31 May 1776.<sup>[57]</sup>

On 8 Nov 1779, he sold 360 acres on the south side of Reedy Creek adjoining John Duke and near father-in-law Lewis Bobbitt to son Darling Maddray.<sup>[58]</sup> Richard was in the 1784 North Carolina Census with 1 male between ages 21-60, 0 males under 21 or over 60, 1 female, and 2 slaves.<sup>[59]</sup> In the 1790 Census, there were 1 male 16 and over, 2 males under 16, 2 females, and 2 slaves in the household.<sup>[60]</sup>

On 26 May 1788, Richard paid son Darling 53 pounds for his household furniture and other items.<sup>[61]</sup> Richard sold 100 acres to John Stokeley on 26 Sep 1789.<sup>[62]</sup> Richard was involved in a complicated court agreement on 20 Nov 1789. It seems that the estate of John Jones owed 39 pounds to both William Duke and his son Darling Maddray. The administrators of John's estate were putting up lands and chattels as collateral to Richard just in case the debt was not paid.<sup>[63]</sup>

Richard must have been having some health challenges because he gave to grandson James Maddray, son of Darling, 200 acres of land, horses, cattle, and furniture on 11 Nov 1795.<sup>[64]</sup> He recovered and lived for almost 15 years. He sold Lewis Clarke 300 acres on Reedy Creek on 1 Mar 1808.<sup>[65]</sup> Richard was in the 1810 Census.<sup>[66]</sup> His estate was dated 5 Jun 1812.<sup>[67]</sup>

**6.** James<sup>3</sup> Maddray (*James*<sup>2</sup>, *James*<sup>1</sup>) was born about 1726 in Isle of Wight County and died before 1760<sup>[68]</sup> in Granville County. James married **Ann Ward**, daughter of **27.** Joseph Ward and Elizabeth (---), about 1750 in Isle of Wight County. Ann was born about 1729 in Isle of Wight County and died before 15 Mar 1811 in Warren County. Ann next married **Randolph Hazelwood**, possibly the son of **Richard Hazelwood** and **Mrs. Richard Hazelwood**, about 1750

in Granville County. Randolph was born about 1727 in Virginia and died after 31 Jan 1797 in Warren County.<sup>[69]</sup> James was owed money in the estate of **30. Benjamin Ward** recorded 6 Aug 1752.<sup>[70]</sup> James arrived in Granville County after his brother Richard in 1754.<sup>[71]</sup> James was mentioned in the 1758 taxable list with three taxable in the household.<sup>[72]</sup> He was mentioned in the guardian records of Susannah Hardyman, orphan of Thomas Hardyman, in Isle of Wight County on 7 Aug 1755.<sup>[73]</sup>

After his arrival in Granville County, both James and his brother Richard signed an undated petition requesting a road from Shoco Creek to the main road below Stone House Creek.<sup>[74]</sup> James started to patent 640 acres on Reedy Creek on 13 May 1757. The process was not completed before he passed away and the patent was actually finished by his wife Ann by 1 Dec 1760.<sup>[75]</sup> James left an estate in Feb 1760.<sup>[76]</sup> The estate papers also list the division of his estate among his children.

Ann received a bequest from her father Joseph Ward on 12 Dec 1762.<sup>[77]</sup> Ann Maddray was in 1760-61 tax list with a Randolph Hazelwood living in her household along with 3 slaves.<sup>[78]</sup> Ann then married Randolph Hazelwood in 1762. Randolph was listed as head of the house in the 1762-1763 tax list with the same 3 slaves Ann had previously.<sup>[79]</sup>

Randolph may have come from Southampton County, Virginia. Randolph was not mentioned in the estate of possible father Richard Hazelwood recorded on 11 Dec 1760 in Southampton County.<sup>[80]</sup>

Randolph bought and sold quite a bit of land in his life time. Typically, wife Ann joined him in selling the land. On 25 Jul 1765, he and wife Ann sold 100 acres on the Buffalo Branch to William Powell.<sup>[81]</sup> He bought two tracts on Fishing Creek totaling 590 acres from John Langston and his wife Elizabeth on 26 Aug 1771 only to sell it to Edmond Kearney on 29 Jan 1772 for 40 pounds less.<sup>[82]</sup> He purchased 117 acres on Reedy Creek from stepson John Maddray on 6 Dec 1774.<sup>[83]</sup>

Randolph sold 200 acres on Reedy Creek to his stepson William Maddray on 10 Feb 1777 for 20 pounds.<sup>[84]</sup>

Randolph was in the 1784 North Carolina Census having no male between ages 21-60, 1 male under 21 or over 60, 1 female, and 12 slaves.<sup>[85]</sup> In the 1790 Census, there were 1 male 16 and over, 1 male under 16, 2 females, and 9 slaves in the household.<sup>[86]</sup> Randolph left a will on 31 Jan 1797. His estate papers that included his inventory were processed in 1798.<sup>[87]</sup> Ann outlived her second husband and left an estate in 1811.<sup>[88]</sup>

Children from the marriage of James Maddray and Anne Ward were:

- 19 M iii. William<sup>4</sup> Maddray was born in 1754 in Isle of Wight County and died after 1805.
  - F iv. **Elizabeth<sup>4</sup> Maddray** was born about 1757 in Granville County. Elizabeth was mentioned only as a legatee in the estate of her father James Maddray on 12 Aug 1761<sup>[89]</sup> and a witness of a deed involving brother John Maddray on 6 Dec 1774.<sup>[90]</sup>
  - M v. **Moses<sup>4</sup> Maddray** was born about 1759 in Granville County and died before 12 Feb 1777 in Bute County, North Carolina. Moses was only mentioned receiving items in the estate of father James Maddray on 12 Aug 1761<sup>[91]</sup> and when writing his will on 9 Dec 1776.<sup>[92]</sup> His estate was filed in 1778.<sup>[93]</sup>

Children from the marriage of Randolph Hazelwood and Anne Ward were:

**7. Peter**<sup>3</sup> **Maddray** (*Zachariah*<sup>2</sup>, *James*<sup>1</sup>) was born about 1716 in Surry County and died about 1749 in Surry County. He married **Sarah** (---) about 1738 in Surry County. Sarah was born about 1718 in Surry County and died after 23 Sep 1766 in Surry County.<sup>[94]</sup>

Peter was a witness in two land transactions. The first was between William Smith and Thomas Warren on 7 Nov 1738<sup>[95]</sup> and the next was between John Clements and James Price recorded on 17 Dec 1738.<sup>[96]</sup> Peter was also mentioned, along with his father, in the estate of Mary Davidson on 17 Sep 1739.<sup>[97]</sup> Peter had one son named Zachariah who was orphaned by 17 Oct 1749.<sup>[98]</sup>

Sarah showed up in several court records after the death of Peter. She was in a suit with Robert Nern dated 17 Jul 1753.<sup>[99]</sup> Sarah was paid to be a witness for William Brown on 21 Jan 1755.<sup>[100]</sup> She also sued John Moring and John Collier on 18 Nov 1755.<sup>[101]</sup> Sarah left a will on 23 Sep 1766.

**8. Miss**<sup>3</sup> **Maddray** (*Zachariah*<sup>2</sup>, *James*<sup>1</sup>) was born about 1718 in Surry County and died about 1747 in Surry County. She probably married **Thomas Davis** about 1740 in Surry County. Thomas was born in 1718 in Elizabeth City County, Virginia and died after 17 Mar 1766 in Surry County.<sup>[102]</sup> Thomas next married **Mary Smith**, daughter of **William Smith** and **Elizabeth** (---), about 1748 in Surry County. Mary was born about 1720 and died after 17 Mar 1766 in Surry County.

Miss Maddray did not show up in the records. She was deceased by the time of her father's will in 1748. Her son James Davis was mentioned as a grandson to Zachariah in the will. Thomas purchased 60 acres near the Hunniford Bridge from Thomas Hart and wife Branbley on 24 Oct 1763.<sup>[103]</sup> Thomas Davis left a will on 17 Oct 1766 which showed that son James was the only one of his sons over age 21. Thomas left his inventory recorded 18 Jul 1769.<sup>[104]</sup>

Thomas married Mary Smith about 1748 and had 5 children by him. Mary was mentioned only in the wills of her husband and her father William Smith on 5 Jul 1755.<sup>[105]</sup> Mary outlived husband Thomas Davis.

Unfortunately, reaching definitive conclusions in family history research is frequently difficult because of conflicting information. So it is with Thomas Davis. Thomas had been in Surry County for some years but for some unexplained reason he claimed to be from Elizabeth City County on 10 Jan 1755 when he purchased 300 acres from William Little and wife Mourning.<sup>[106]</sup> About two years earlier on 17 Apr 1753, Thomas and William Little were securities for Ann Davis on the estate of a John Davis.<sup>[107]</sup> This John Davis left an estate documents filed in court on 20 Mar 1749.<sup>[108]</sup> and 16 Jul 1754.<sup>[109]</sup>

Son James Davis was an important clue in identifying Thomas Davis as the husband of Miss Maddray. The only other known Mr. Davis having a child named James was Henry Davis Sr. who died about 1767. Details of Henry's estate recorded on 22 Oct 1776 show that his son James had at least six older siblings and possible younger siblings.<sup>[110]</sup> The ages do not work for Henry to be a son-in-law of Zachariah<sup>2</sup>.

**9.** Mr.<sup>3</sup> Maddray (*Zachariah*<sup>2</sup>, *James*<sup>1</sup>) was born about 1719 in Surry County and died in 1743 in Surry County. He married Mary (---) about 1740 in Surry County. Mary was born in 1718 in Surry County and died before 22 Mar 1774 in Surry County.<sup>[111]</sup> Mary next married John Slade, son of Edward Slade and Mrs. Edward Slade, about 1744 in Surry County and had five children by him. John was born about 1718 in Surry County and died before 20 Oct 1761 in Surry County.<sup>[112]</sup>

Mr.<sup>3</sup> Maddray married Mary and had a daughter named Priscilla Maddray. Unfortunately, Mr.<sup>3</sup> Maddray was not found in any known record. His existence is implied because both Priscilla and Mary were mentioned in the estate record of John Slade recorded on 20 Jan 1767.<sup>[113]</sup> John's administrators "paid Priscilla Maddra as her Mothers Bond which she gave her in full for her part of her Fathers Estate before her Mothers Marriag with John Slade". The "Mothers Bond" mentioned was dated from 8 Feb 1744/45. It is very likely that Priscilla was born in 1742 or 1743 based on the bond date. Mary was the administrator on husband John's estate on 20 Oct 1761.<sup>[114]</sup>

The two most helpful clues in determining how Priscilla fit into the Zachariah Maddray family are having a mother named Mary and the bond dated 8 Feb 1744/45. There are several possible ways that these facts can be applied to Priscilla. The most likely possibilities are that Priscilla is either a child of a son of Zachariah or she married a son or grandson of Zachariah. Fortunately, there was only one Maddray family in the area at the time, which helps limit the search.

Zachariah had two known sons by his first wife, Peter and James. Peter<sup>3</sup> died about 1747. He had a wife named Sarah, who outlived him by about 20 years. James<sup>3</sup> lived until 1783 and died in North Carolina. In addition, James<sup>3</sup> had no children born before 1745 to provide a grandchild for Priscilla to marry. None of the sons of second wife married before 1750 so their children were not old enough to be the spouse of Priscilla. Consequently, none of the known sons or grandsons of Zachariah could be the father of Priscilla.

No will or estate in Surry County from 1735 to 1745 shows a widow named Mary with a daughter named Priscilla. In addition, the name Priscilla is very rare in the county will records. Court records surrounding the Feb 1744/45 marriage bond record provided no additional clues. Consequently, the most logical option is that Zachariah had an unidentified son, Mr.<sup>3</sup> Maddray, who married Mary and had a daughter named Priscilla.

John Slade was first mentioned as a witness to the will of James Davis on 4 Sep 1746.<sup>[115]</sup> He was mentioned in the will of his grandfather Edward Slade on 9 Jul 1747 and given a portion of his estate after the death of his grandmother.<sup>[116]</sup> He was in a suit with Thomas Davidson on 19 Jun 1753.<sup>[117]</sup> John's estate was first recorded on 20 Oct 1761 with brothers-in-law William Maddray and John Maddray as appraisers.

Mary was mentioned in several other estate papers including William Marriott recorded 18 Aug 1767<sup>[118]</sup> and Thomas Binns recorded 13 Oct 1768.<sup>[119]</sup> She left an estate recorded on 28 Jun 1774.<sup>[120]</sup>

**10. James**<sup>3</sup> **Maddray** (*Zachariah*<sup>2</sup>, *James*<sup>1</sup>) was born about 1720 in Surry County and died after 22 Apr 1783 in Northampton County.<sup>[121]</sup> James married **Mary** (---) about 1743 in Surry County. Mary was born about 1721 in Surry County and died after 22 Apr 1783 in Northampton County.

James first showed up in the records as a witness to the will of Walter White on 23 Sep 1743.<sup>[122]</sup> He was given the land where he now lived and a slave in the will of his father on 4 Mar 1747/48.<sup>[123]</sup> On 10 Sep 1748, James was a witness to a sale of land from Thomas Humphries to Patience Jordan of

Isle of Wight.<sup>[124]</sup> He was mentioned in the estate of James Clinch on 16 Dec 1753.<sup>[125]</sup> On 14 Mar 1757, he was a witness to the land transaction from John Moring and wife Elizabeth of Johnston County, North Carolina to George Anderson for 360 acres on Harrys Swamp.<sup>[126]</sup>

James was in Northampton County by 17 Dec 1767 when he purchased 60 acres on the south side of the Meherrin River at the Flat Branch and Cypress Swamp from William and wife Ann Michell.<sup>[127]</sup> James returned from Northampton County to Surry County briefly to sell 30 acres of land given to him by his father Zachariah Maddray to Mary Carroll on 5 Nov 1773.<sup>[128]</sup> Back in Northampton County, he patented 500 acres of land adjoining John Brittle's Corner and cousin Drury Deberry starting on 3 Mar 1779 and completed by 29 Oct 1782.<sup>[129]</sup> James made his will on 22 Apr 1783. His wife Mary outlived him.

**11. John<sup>3</sup> Maddray** (*Zachariah*<sup>2</sup>, *James*<sup>1</sup>) was born about 1725 in Surry County and died after 10 Jul 1782 in Surry County.<sup>[130]</sup> He married **Rebecca** (---) about 1759 in Surry County. She was born about 1727 in Surry County and died after 27 Apr 1774 in Surry County.<sup>[131]</sup> He married secondly **Elizabeth** (---) about 1778 in Surry County. Elizabeth was born about 1755 in Surry County and died after 18 Oct 1814 in Surry County.<sup>[132]</sup>

On 6 May 1747, John was the executor on his grandmother Elizabeth (---) Hurdle's will.<sup>[133]</sup> He was given the land where he now lived and two slaves in the will of his father on 4 Mar 1747/48.<sup>[134]</sup> He owned property on Bynams Branch adjoining Joseph Lancaster and Robert Davis on 11 Aug 1750.<sup>[135]</sup> John and his brother William were appraisers on the estate of brother-in-law John Slade dated 20 Oct 1761.<sup>[136]</sup> He and his brother William are mentioned in the estate of John Spratley recorded on 20 Aug 1765.<sup>[137]</sup> John was one of children who took mother Joanna to court over the

execution of his father's estate dated 18 Apr 1769.<sup>[138]</sup> He left a will dated 10 Jul 1782 listing his children. John's inventory was completed on 20 Apr 1783.<sup>[139]</sup> John's estate took a long time to settle. On 29 Nov 1804, it was still being handled in court.<sup>[140]</sup>

First wife Rebecca made only one appearance in the records. She was a witness in a lawsuit dated 27 Apr 1774. Elizabeth came to court and was declared exempt for being a taxable on 25 Feb 1806.<sup>[141]</sup> She was probably a generation younger than John because she wrote her will dated 14 Oct 1814. Her estate valuation by the court was ordered on 22 May 1815.<sup>[142]</sup>

**12.** William<sup>3</sup> Maddray (*Zachariah*<sup>2</sup>, *James*<sup>1</sup>) was born about 1726 in Surry County and died after 21 Jun 1772 in Surry County.<sup>[143]</sup> William married Margaret (---) about 1750 in Surry County.<sup>[144]</sup> She was born about 1718 Surry County and died in 1755 in Surry County. Margaret had previously married William Crews, son of Thomas Crews and Mary (---), about 1738 in Surry Virginia. William Crews was born about 1716 in Surry County and died in 1749 in Surry County. William Maddray married secondly Elizabeth (---) in 1756 in Surry County. Elizabeth was born about 1726 in Surry County and died before 4 Apr 1783 in Surry County.<sup>[145]</sup>

William<sup>3</sup> was mentioned in the records only a few times. He was given land on Pidgeon Swamp, two slaves, and furniture in the will of his father on 4 Mar 1747/48.<sup>[146]</sup> William and wife Margaret were in a suit with Samuel and John Thompson on 17 Jul 1753.<sup>[147]</sup> He and brother John were appraisers on the estate of brother-in-law John Slate dated 20 Oct 1761.<sup>[148]</sup> He was also the administrator of William Crews' estate recorded on 16 Mar 1762.<sup>[149]</sup> William<sup>3</sup> was mentioned in the estate of John Spratley recorded on 20 Aug 1765.<sup>[150]</sup> He left a will on 25 Jun 1772 mentioning his children. William's<sup>3</sup> estate was completed in Mar 1773.<sup>[151]</sup>

His first wife was Margaret had previously married William Crews and was the executrix of his estate recorded 16 Jul 1751.<sup>[152]</sup> William Crews received land and other items from his father's will on 21 Jan 1727/28.<sup>[153]</sup> William Crews, wife Margaret, and Richard Rowell sold 100 acres on Grays Creek to William Clinch on 9 Sep 1741.<sup>[154]</sup> Margaret was acting as executrix for her first husband on 17 Jul 1753 when she and William<sup>3</sup> were in a suit with Samuel and John Thompson.<sup>[155]</sup>

Elizabeth was in court and appointed guardian of her son William Maddray on 23 Mar 1779.<sup>[156]</sup> Elizabeth left an inventory on 4 Apr 1783.

**13. Ann**<sup>3</sup> **Maddray** (*Zachariah*<sup>2</sup>, *James*<sup>1</sup>) was born about 1730 in Surry County and died after 18 Apr 1769 in Surry County.<sup>[157]</sup> Ann married **Stephen Collier**, son of **John Collier** and **Jane** (---), about 1755 in Surry County. Stephen was born about 1728 in Surry County and died before 29 Jan 1796 in Surry County.<sup>[158]</sup> He married secondly **Vincy Hobbs** on 22 Jun 1779 in Surry County.<sup>[159]</sup> Vincy was born about 1733 in Surry County and probably predeceased her husband Stephen.

Ann was mentioned in the will of her father and given a slave, furniture, and money on 4 Mar 1747/48.<sup>[160]</sup> Her only other appearance in the records was in a court action against her mother Joanna on 18 Apr 1769 trying to obtain some of her father's estate.<sup>[161]</sup>

Stephen received three properties, slaves, and other items in the will of his father John Collier on 12 Aug 1754.<sup>[162]</sup> He sold to Henry Collier 100 acres on the south side of Cypress Swamp on 18 Aug 1767.<sup>[163]</sup> Stephen married secondly Vincy. They sold three tracts of land together. They sold 380 acres to John Collier on the Toms Branch, Nicholas Branch, and the Great Branch to John Collier dated 26 Oct 1779.<sup>[164]</sup> On 28 Mar 1780, they sold to John Tillott 67 acres on the old School House

Branch.<sup>[165]</sup> On that same day, they sold 100 acres to Henry Jordan on the old School House Branch.<sup>[166]</sup> On 29 Jan 1796, his estate was filed with the court.

**14.** Sarah<sup>3</sup> Maddray (*Zachariah*<sup>2</sup>, *James*<sup>1</sup>) was born about 1731 in Surry County and died before Jul 1763 in Surry County.<sup>[167]</sup> Sarah married Edward Bailey Jr., son of Edward Bailey Sr. and possibly wife Jane (---), about 1752 in Surry County. Edward was born about 1731 in Surry County and died before 19 Mar 1763.<sup>[168]</sup>

Sarah was mentioned only in the will of her father and given a slave and furniture on 4 Mar 1747/48.<sup>[169]</sup> She was not mentioned in any document with Edward. Sarah was placed as a spouse to Edward Bailey because Edward's administrators were part of the suit against Sarah's mother Joanna on 18 Apr 1769.<sup>[170]</sup> Both Sarah and her husband Edward were dead by then. Edward's estate was trying to recover a slave that had been promised to Sarah in the will of her father.

Edward purchased 100 acres adjoining Nicholas Thompson and Charles Binns from John Kea dated 23 Dec 1754.<sup>[171]</sup> He sold this land to William Green on 18 Mar 1760.<sup>[172]</sup> On 21 Jan 1755, Edward was in a suit with John Mooring.<sup>[173]</sup> He received in his father's will the plantation his father purchased of Holiday Fort on 26 Nov 1758.<sup>[174]</sup> Edward was in a suit concerning the estate of Thomas Petway where his mother-in-law Joanna Maddray participated as a court witness dated 15 May 1759.<sup>[175]</sup> Processing of Edward's estate began on 3 Jul 1763 and lasted until 1770.<sup>[176]</sup>

**15.** Joel<sup>3</sup> Maddray (*Zachariah*<sup>2</sup>, *James*<sup>1</sup>) was born about 1733 in Surry County and died in Dec 1801 in Surry County. Joel married Lucy Warren, the daughter of Thomas Warren and wife Lucy (---), on 2 Mar 1774 in Surry County.<sup>[177]</sup> Lucy was born about 1750 in Surry County and died by 1778 in Surry County. Joel married secondly Ann Cocke Thompson, daughter of John

**Thompson** and **Ann** (---), on 2 Sep 1779 in Surry County.<sup>[178]</sup> Ann was born 1755 in Surry County and died before 22 Jan 1816 in Surry County.<sup>[179]</sup>

Joel was mentioned in the will of his father and given the plantation where his father lived, a slave, furniture, and money on 4 Mar 1747/48.<sup>[180]</sup> He went to court to get some of his father's estate from his mother on 19 Jun 1759.<sup>[181]</sup> Joel and brother-in-law Stephen Collier purchased a slave from John Davis on 20 May 1772.<sup>[182]</sup> Joel was an executor of his brother William's will on 21 Jun 1772.<sup>[183]</sup> Joel was still executing the will on 27 Nov 1792 when he and others were being sued by nephew Bob Maddray.<sup>[184]</sup>

Joel was allowed to own an ordinary in the county dated 25 Oct 1774.<sup>[185]</sup> He was the executor of nephew Christopher Maddray's will dated 5 Sep 1779.<sup>[186]</sup> Joel was paid for a court appearance on 23 Nov 1801.<sup>[187]</sup> By 22 Dec 1801, he had passed away when John Cocke was made responsible for providing support for his wife Ann. John was one of the overseers of the poor of Surry County and he had funds to give Ann.<sup>[188]</sup>

Lucy (Warren) Maddray predeceased her husband. Lucy was given a bequest in the will of father Thomas Warren on 25 Apr 1759<sup>[189]</sup> another from brother Robert Warren in 1758.<sup>[190]</sup> She was dead by 1778. Lucy Warren's sister Mary Warren married John Batts as his second wife. John had previously married **16. Lucy Maddray**.

Ann was in a suit against John Briggs so she could recover her dower land dated 24 Nov 1803.<sup>[191]</sup> Her estate was handled by son Philip Maddray on 22 Jan 1816.

**16.** Lucy<sup>3</sup> Maddray (*Zachariah*<sup>2</sup>, *James*<sup>1</sup>) was born about 1735 in Surry County and died after 18 Apr 1769 in Surry County.<sup>[192]</sup> Lucy married John Batts, son of William Batts and Mrs.

William Batts, about 1760 in Surry County. John was born about 1730 in Surry County and died after 14 Mar 1785 in Surry County.<sup>[193]</sup> John married secondly Mary Warren, daughter of **Thomas Warren** and Lucy (---), about 1772 in Surry County. Mary was born about 1738 in Surry County and died before 5 Jan 1796 in Surry County.<sup>[194]</sup>

Lucy was given a slave and other items in the will of father Zachariah dated 4 Mar 1748/49.<sup>[195]</sup> Lucy was found in the records on two other occasions. Husband John and Lucy sold 100 acres on the south side of Holly Bush Swamp to Richard Carter on 18 May 1762. In addition, she and some of her siblings were trying to obtain in court some of their inheritance from their mother Joanna on 18 Apr 1769.<sup>[196]</sup>

John received some land in the will of his father dated 31 Dec 1741.<sup>[197]</sup> John was an appraiser on the estate of John Thompson along with brother-in-law William Maddray recorded on 7 Jun 1768.<sup>[198]</sup> His second wife Mary was given a bequest in the will of father Thomas Warren on 25 Apr 1759.<sup>[199]</sup> Mary survived her husband and left an estate dated 30 Jan 1796.

**17.** Mary<sup>4</sup> Maddray (*James*<sup>3</sup>, *James*<sup>2</sup>, *James*<sup>1</sup>) was born about 1752 in Isle of Wight County and died after Feb 1827 in Warren County.<sup>[200]</sup> Mary married Matthew Davis, son of Peter Davis and possibly Amy (---), about 1775 in Bute County. Matthew was born about Aug 1748 in North Carolina and died on 23 Dec 1826 in Warren County.<sup>[201]</sup>

Mary received a legacy from her father James Maddray on 12 Aug 1761. She was also a witness to a land sale by her brother John Maddray on 6 Dec 1774.<sup>[202]</sup> Shortly thereafter, she married Matthew Davis. She was mentioned in the will of husband Matthew Davis 30 Mar 1825.<sup>[203]</sup> She was mentioned in the estate of Matthew as well.<sup>[204]</sup>

The family of Peter Davis moved to Granville County about 1754. Matthew appeared on the same taxable list as brother Stephen about 1764.<sup>[205]</sup> Matthew was a witness to a gift from William Cheek to his son John Cheek for land on Great Fishing Creek dated 7 Nov 1770.<sup>[206]</sup> Matthew purchased his first property in Bute County on Great Fishing Creek and Possom Quarter on 17 Jul 1772 from John Dinkins and his wife Margaret.<sup>[207]</sup> Matthew accused Charles Pritchett of trespass and requested damages on 8 Nov 1774.<sup>[208]</sup> He was on a grand jury on 14 Feb 1775.<sup>[209]</sup> He sued Charles Pritchett again and James Jackson on 11 Feb 1778.<sup>[210]</sup> Matthew fought in the Revolutionary War but the exact details of his participation are not available. He was paid in 1781 and 1782 for his services.<sup>[211]</sup>

Matthew married Mary Maddray about 1775. Matthew was involved in a court case regarding the will and estate of his brother-in-law Moses Maddray.<sup>[212]</sup> Both Matthew and Randolph Hazelwood came to court in Feb 1777 objecting to the will being executed.<sup>[213]</sup> Their appeal must have been rejected by the court because the will was probated in 12 Feb 1778.<sup>[214]</sup>

Randolph Hazelwood sold Matthew 200 acres of land on Rocky Branch and Poplar Branch on 13 Jul 1778.<sup>[215]</sup> Randolph purchased an item for Matthew from the estate of James Rogers on 1 Nov 1781.<sup>[216]</sup> Matthew was in the 1784 North Carolina Census in Warren County with 1 male between ages 21-60, 3 males under 21 or over 60, 2 females, and 5 slaves.<sup>[217]</sup> In the 1790 Census, there were 1 male 16 and over, 3 males under 16, 9 females, and 10 slaves in the household.<sup>[218]</sup> On a 1792 taxables list, he had 1,160 acres of property and 4 slaves.<sup>[219]</sup>

On 5 Dec 1795, Matthew purchased 900 acres from Thomas C. Elliott on Fishing Creek and Posson Quarter Creek next to where he was living.<sup>[220]</sup> He wanted to build a grist mill over Fishing Creek

"that will be a convenience to the neighborhood" by an island near his spring.<sup>[221]</sup> He requested from the county court that an acre of land on both sides of the creek be appraised for that purpose. Later, Matthew decided to sell an acre to John Maclin so John could erect a grist mill instead dated 22 Feb 1796.<sup>[222]</sup>

He made two very large land purchases after 1800. On 4 Dec 1801, he bought 900 acres on Great Fishing Creek, Black Branch, and Oposson Quarter Creek from Robert Hines and his wife Ann of Petersburg, Virginia.<sup>[223]</sup> Matthew purchased 555 acres next to his property from Nathaniel Withers of Sussex County, Virginia on 24 Feb 1802.<sup>[224]</sup>

Matthew was a legatee in the will of his father Peter on 15 Feb 1803 where he was forgiven of all the debts he owed his father.<sup>[225]</sup> He was the administrator for the estate of a Thomas Davis dated 27 Nov 1807.<sup>[226]</sup> Matthew was paid money out of the estate of his mother-in-law Ann (Ward) Maddray Hazelwood on 29 Aug 1811.<sup>[227]</sup> He purchased 388 acres from John T. Kearney on Reedy Creek adjoining the Mill Path and James Kearney on 31 Mar 1820.<sup>[228]</sup> Matthew was injured when he and others were repairing a bridge over Fishing Creek on 4 Nov 1824.<sup>[229]</sup>

Matthew left his own will on 30 Mar 1825 using sons Peter R. and Stephen Davis as executors.<sup>[230]</sup> He died on 23 Dec 1826. His 1827 estate papers have a combination of his inventory, distribution of his estate among his children, and several loans he had given to other individuals.<sup>[231]</sup>

**18.** John<sup>4</sup> Maddray (*James*<sup>3</sup>, *James*<sup>2</sup>, *James*<sup>1</sup>) was born about 1753. John married Chloe Sainsing on 17 Jul 1782 in Warren County.<sup>[232]</sup> Chloe was born about 1755 probably in Granville County and died before 31 Jan 1797 in Warren County.

John was a legatee in the estate of father James Maddray on 12 Aug 1761.<sup>[233]</sup> He was a taxable in 1771 in Bute County.<sup>[234]</sup> It is not certain when he obtained the land but he sold 117 acres on Reedy

Creek to Randolph Hazelwood on 6 Dec 1774 with his sisters Mary and Elizabeth as witnesses.<sup>[235]</sup> John was not found in the Warren County records after being in the 1783 tax list.<sup>[236]</sup> There is no reference to him in the will of stepfather Randolph Hazelwood on 31 Jan 1797.

**19.** William<sup>4</sup> Maddray (James<sup>3</sup>, James<sup>2</sup>, James<sup>1</sup>) was born about 1754 probably in Granville County and died after 1805. William married Millender or Mildred Sainsing, daughter of James Sainsing and Margaret (---), on 21 Feb 1784 in Warren County.<sup>[237]</sup> Mildred was born about 1757 probably in Granville County and died after Feb 1801 in Warren County.

On 12 Aug 1761, William was a legatee in the estate of father James Maddray.<sup>[238]</sup> He was the sole legatee and an executor of the will of brother Moses Maddray dated 9 Dec 1776.<sup>[239]</sup> Moses gave him two slaves and "all my portion in the hands of Mr. Randolph Hazelwood". William purchased 200 acres on Reedy Creek from stepfather Randolph Hazelwood on 10 Feb 1777.<sup>[240]</sup> Two days later William brought the will of his brother Moses to court to have it executed.<sup>[241]</sup> The will was probated on 12 Feb 1778.<sup>[242]</sup>

William was a witness to the will of his stepfather Randolph Hazelwood on 31 Jan 1797.<sup>[243]</sup> William asked for credit from James Frame at his store on 21 Apr 1799. On 3 Feb 1801, James came to court to demand that William pay his outstanding debt.<sup>[244]</sup> He was last mentioned purchasing an item from the estate of Joshua Capps about May 1806.<sup>[245]</sup>

It is unclear exactly when William died. In the 1800 Census for Warren County, there was only one William Maddray and he was no older than 25.<sup>[246]</sup> Also, William's<sup>4</sup> wife Mildred had a stray heifer reported by George Nicholson, the community ranger, in Feb 1801.<sup>[247]</sup> If William was alive, he

probably would have been listed as the owner of the heifer since Mildred was the only female on the list. Mildred received items in the will of her father James Sainsing on 15 Aug 1764.<sup>[248]</sup>

20. Sarah<sup>4</sup> Hazelwood (Ann<sup>3</sup>, James<sup>2</sup>, James<sup>1</sup>) was born about 1765 in Bute County and died before 14 Dec 1803 in Isle of Wight County.<sup>[249]</sup> Sarah married **Emelius Dering**, son of **James Dering** and **Mrs. James Dering**, on 11 Apr 1782 in Warren County.<sup>[250]</sup> Emilius was born about 1760 in Isle of Wight County and died before 16 May 1796 in Isle of Wight County.<sup>[251]</sup> Sarah married secondly William Hardy, son of Richard Hardy and Marcella Davis, on 20 Dec 1792 in Isle of Wight County.<sup>[252]</sup> William was born about 1758 in Isle of Wight County and died before 22 Feb 1795 in Isle of Wight County. Sarah married thirdly J'Anson Edwards, son of Thomas Edwards and 33. Unity Ward, on 6 Feb 1796 in Isle of Wight County.<sup>[253]</sup> J'Anson was born about 1756 in Surry County and died after 4 Nov 1796 in Isle of Wight County.<sup>[254]</sup> J'Anson had previously married Ann Pitman on 3 Dec 1785 in Isle of Wight County.<sup>[255]</sup> Ann was born about 1760 probably in Isle of Wight County and died before 1794 in Isle of Wight County.

Sarah was married three times. The first was to Emulius Dering in Warren County on 11 Apr 1782. Shortly thereafter, they relocated to Isle of Wight County. Sarah still appeared in the Warren County records on two occasions associated with her father's will and estate. On 31 Jan 1797, she was bequeathed a portion of the estate of her father.<sup>[256]</sup> Sarah left an estate dated 14 Dec 1803 in Isle of Wight. Her son John Dering administered her estate that included a suit against William Ware on 5 Mar 1806.<sup>[257]</sup> The heirs of Sarah were mentioned in her father's estate in Warren County on 1 Mar 1811.<sup>[258]</sup>

First husband Emulius was given land, slaves, animals, and other items in the will of his father James Dering on 14 Jan 1784.<sup>[259]</sup> His estate was recorded on 6 Jun 1796.

Sarah next had a very short marriage to William Hardy. He was given land in the will of father Richard Hardy on 8 Jun 1789.<sup>[260]</sup> William was the administrator on the estate of Emelius Dering and

was deceased by 6 Feb 1796 when Sarah had married J'Anson Edwards. William's estate was processed on 3 Sep 1798<sup>[261]</sup> and 5 Jan 1800.<sup>[262]</sup>

Her final marriage was to J'Anson Edwards. J'Anson was born and raised in Surry County. He was an executor on his father's will and received land and other items on 12 Dec 1781.<sup>[263]</sup> J'Anson and two other brothers migrated to Isle of Wight starting in the 1780s. He did not live very long after his marriage to Sarah and left a will on 4 Nov 1796 just 9 months later. Sarah was given slaves during her lifetime and made executrix along with his brother Newitt Edwards. The slaves were to go to a child in esse after Sarah's death. She was administering the estates of her last two husbands at the same time. J'Anson had previously married Ann Pitman and had children by her.

**21.** Lucy<sup>4</sup> Hazelwood (*Ann*<sup>3</sup>, *James*<sup>2</sup>, *James*<sup>1</sup>) was born about 1765 in Bute County and died after 16 Jun 1845 in Warren County.<sup>[264]</sup> Lucy married Joseph Stallings, son of John Stallings and Elizabeth Ward, on 1 Nov 1784 in Warren County.<sup>[265]</sup> Joseph was born about 1755 in Isle of Wight County and died after 29 Sep 1801 in Isle of Wight County. Lucy married secondly John Wombwell Jr, son of John Womble or Wombwell Sr. and Mary (---), about 1802 in Isle of Wight County. John was born about 1735 in Isle of Wight County and died on 15 Apr 1804 in Isle of Wight County. John had previously married Mrs. John Wombwell and had children by her. Lucy married thirdly Michael Edwards, son of Thomas Edwards and 33. Unity Ward, about 1806 in Isle of Wight County. <sup>[266]</sup> Michael had previously married first Elizabeth Jones, daughter of Benjamin Jones and Mary Gray, on 20 May 1786 in Isle of Wight County. <sup>[267]</sup> Elizabeth was born on 4 Apr 1767 in Isle of Wight County and died before 1794 in Surry County. Michael then married second Martha (---) about 1794 in Surry County. Martha was born about 1760 probably in Surry County and died before 1800 in Surry County.

Lucy was very much like her sister Sarah in that she also married three times. The first marriage was in Warren County to Joseph Stallings on 1 Nov 1784. They also shortly migrated to Isle of Wight County where she lived until about 1820. She then returned to Warren County after the death of her husband Michael Edwards and left a will dated 16 Jun 1845. Lucy also received land and other items in her father's will on 31 Jan 1797.<sup>[268]</sup>

Her husband Joseph Stallings was also her second cousin. Both Lucy and Joseph had mothers who were from the Ward family of Isle of Wight County (see later). Joseph first appeared in the records as an appraiser of Mason Braddy recorded 6 Oct 1785.<sup>[269]</sup> He was given land and other items and

was an executor of his father's will on 10 Apr 1786.<sup>[270]</sup> Joseph was frequently found being guardian and other forms of providing security for sister-in-law **20. Sarah's** family as recorded on 5 Sep 1796.<sup>[271]</sup> Joseph left a will on 29 Sep 1801.<sup>[272]</sup> He gave to his wife Lucy some animals and furniture.

Lucy's second husband was John Wombwell. John was first mentioned when he provided security for the will of his brother Joseph Wombwell recorded on 4 Jan 1784.<sup>[273]</sup> John and wife Lucy sold 160 acres in Southampton County on the south side of Tarrepen Swamp to John Bailey on 10 Jan 1804.<sup>[274]</sup> He left a will on 20 Oct 1803.<sup>[275]</sup> Lucy was given money in his will.

Lucy married Michael Edwards near the end of 1806. Michael had relocated to Isle of Wight probably sometime in 1804. There is an interesting record that documents all of Lucy's marriages. On 5 Jan 1807, Lucy and her third husband Michael came to court and gave up their guardianship of the orphans of Joseph Stallings, her first husband. She signed as Lucy Womble, the last name of her second husband. Somehow giving up the guardianship of stepson Joseph Stallings did not last too long. Michael was the guardian for him again on 7 Jan 1811.<sup>[276]</sup>

Prior to his marriage to Lucy, Michael had married twice. He first married Elizabeth Jones. Elizabeth was not mentioned again but her children were mentioned in the will her father Benjamin Jones dated 19 Feb 1804.<sup>[277]</sup> Second, Michael married Martha (---). Michael and wife Martha sold his brother Newitt Edwards 119 acres of land next to brother J'Anson on 27 Oct 1795.<sup>[278]</sup> Michael had dealings in Isle of Wight as early as 1791.<sup>[279]</sup> However, Michael was still in Surry County when he sold slaves and other items to Frederick Gray on 9 Feb 1804.<sup>[280]</sup> Michael Edwards left a will on 1 Apr 1819 in Isle of Wight County. He mentioned three children from is first marriage.

For some reason, Lucy was listed as a taxable in Daniel B. Allen's district in Warren County with 440 acres for 1811.<sup>[281]</sup> As Lucy Edwards, she was a purchaser in the estate of her father dated 15 Mar 1811.<sup>[282]</sup> Lucy was in the 1820 Census in Warren County, North Carolina.<sup>[283]</sup> She died in 1845.<sup>[284]</sup>

## **Descendants of Thomas Ward of Surry County, Virginia**

The last name of Ward was not a very common name in the general area of Surry County in the late 1600s. Unfortunately two Thomas Wards about the same age passed away there at the same time and so their families needed to be sorted out. Thomas' was a Surry County resident and the other Thomas Ward lived just over the border in Isle of Wight County. This second Thomas does not appear to be related to the Surry County Wards.

22. Thomas<sup>1</sup> Ward was born in 1647 in England and died after 20 Feb 1675/76 in Surry County.<sup>[285]</sup> Thomas married Elizabeth (---) in 1666 in England. Elizabeth was born in 1648 in England and died after 2 Jul 1693 in Surry County.<sup>[286]</sup> Elizabeth married secondly **Joseph** Richardson Sr. about 1677 in Surry County and had one child by him. Joseph was born about 1648 in England and died before 15 Jan 1722 in Surry County.

Thomas first appeared in the records as a taxable on 10 Jun 1675.<sup>[287]</sup> Sometime in 1675 William Cooke sold him 100 acres.<sup>[288]</sup> On 2 Nov 1675, he was paid for killing a panther.<sup>[289]</sup> Thomas died very young with four children. Thomas wrote his will on 20 Feb 1675/76 and it was probated on 4 Jul 1676. In Thomas' will Elizabeth received furniture and the use of his plantation until son Thomas came of age. Estate papers were filed on 16 Mar 1675/76, with wife Elizabeth being the administratrix.<sup>[290]</sup> Elizabeth married secondly Joseph Richardson Sr. Over time, as her three sons reached the age of 16, they appeared as taxables in Joseph's household in the 1690s. Elizabeth was the mother of Joseph Richardson Jr.

Joseph Richardson Sr. was an appraiser of the estate of Solomon Davis on 12 Dec 1680.<sup>[291]</sup> He was on a jury dated 1 May 1683.<sup>[292]</sup> On 4 Mar 1700/01, Joseph was in a suit with Joseph John Jackman and his wife Elizabeth.<sup>[293]</sup> Joseph came to court on 7 May 1706 and petitioned to stop paying public levies because of his age.<sup>[294]</sup> He was also an appraiser on the estate of Henry Savage on 20 Jun 1711.[295]

Joseph purchased 300 acres adjoining Mr. Savage and Samuel Thompson in Surry County on 3 Mar 1690/91. Joseph and wife Elizabeth sold to her son Thomas Ward land where "I and my wife lately

lived" on 2 Jul 1693.<sup>[296]</sup> He was deceased by 15 Jan 1722 when Joseph Richardson Jr. sold the property his father had purchased on 3 Mar 1690.

Children from the marriage of Thomas Ward and Elizabeth (---) were:

- M i. **Hannah**<sup>2</sup> **Ward** was born in 1667 probably in England. Hannah was only mentioned in the will of her father dated 20 Feb 1675/76.
- 23 M i. Thomas<sup>2</sup> Ward was born in 1670 probably in England and died after 15 Apr 1727 in Isle of Wight County.
- 24 M ii. William<sup>2</sup> Ward was born in 1674 in England.
- 25 M iii. **John<sup>2</sup> Ward** was born in 1675 in Surry County and died after 30 Aug 1715 in Surry County.

Children from the marriage of Joseph Richardson Sr. and Elizabeth (---) were:

26 M i. **Joseph**<sup>2</sup> **Richardson Jr.** was born in 1687 in Surry County and died after 29 Oct 1753 in Johnston County.

**23.** Thomas<sup>2</sup> Ward (*Thomas*<sup>1</sup>) was born in 1670<sup>[297]</sup> probably in England and died after 25 Jun 1727 in Isle of Wight County.<sup>[298]</sup> Thomas married Joanna Rayner, daughter of Francis Rayner and Joanna (---), in 1694 in Isle of Wight County. Joanna was born in 1675 in Isle of Wight County and died after 25 Jun 1727 in Isle of Wight County.

Thomas was given some land when he came of age plus other items in the will of his father dated 20 Feb 1675/76.<sup>[299]</sup> Thomas came to court on 1 Mar 1690/91 to petition the court because his stepfather Joseph Richardson "detains from him a piece of land given to him by his Father in his Last Will." Two days later, Joseph complies. Thomas witnessed a land sale from John Person Jr. of Isle of Wight County to Henry Hart on 25 Mar 1693.<sup>[300]</sup> He was in a suit with Richard Biton on 7 Nov 1699.<sup>[301]</sup>

Fulfilling civic duties did not seem to be on Thomas' list of enjoyable activities. On 4 Sep 1694, he was called into court to show cause why he did not attend the last court as a grand juror.<sup>[302]</sup> He was constantly in court over the next 10 years about his inattention to his jury responsibilities. On 3 Jan 1698/99, he was presented to the grand jury for not presenting his taxable list.<sup>[303]</sup>

Thomas purchased 100 acres from his brother John Ward and wife Ellenor on 3 Mar 1697.<sup>[304]</sup> He was in the Surry County militia in Nov 1701.<sup>[305]</sup> On 9 Oct 1707, he was of Surry County when he purchased 300 acres in Isle of Wight County on the first swamp of the Blackwater River adjoining Huff Branch, Highgate Hill Branch, Thomas Womble, and Richard Gray from Robert Monger and wife Ellinor on 9 Oct 1707.<sup>[306]</sup> He followed that purchase with another 100 acres of neighboring land from George Moore and wife Jane on 22 Feb 1709.<sup>[307]</sup> On 2 May 1710, Thomas sold 100 acres on the east side of second swamp which was "land whereon I live" to John Chambers.<sup>[308]</sup>

Thomas had relocated to Isle of Wight County by 29 Sep 1716 when he was an executor of the will of father-in-law Francis Rayner.<sup>[309]</sup> He and neighbor Thomas Williams were appraisers of the estate of John Clarke on 22 Dec 1722.<sup>[310]</sup> When Thomas Williams passed away a few years later, Thomas<sup>2</sup> appraised his estate on 22 May 1727.<sup>[311]</sup> Thomas was "discharged from the parish leavy" on 25 Jun 1727.<sup>[312]</sup> He left an estate on 20 Nov 1728.<sup>[313]</sup>

His wife Joanna was mentioned a few times in her life. She was mentioned in passing in the will of her father Francis on 29 Sep 1716. Joanna was given some household items and use of "the plantation where I now live" during her lifetime in her husband's will.

Children from the marriage of Thomas Ward and Joanna Rayner were:

- 29 F Olive<sup>3</sup> Ward was born in 1705 in Surry County and died after 22 Mar 1784 in Isle of Wight iv. County.
- Benjamin<sup>3</sup> Ward was born in 1710 in Surry County and died before 6 Feb 1751/52 in Isle of 30 M v. Wight County.
- Francis<sup>3</sup> Ward was born in 1711 in Surry County and died after 13 Jun 1769 in Isle of 31 M vi. Wight County.

## **24.** William<sup>2</sup> Ward (*Thomas*<sup>1</sup>) was born in 1674<sup>[315]</sup> in Surry County.

William was not mentioned by name in his father's will. William is placed there because of his proximity and dealings with the family of Thomas Ward. He also lived with stepfather Joseph Richardson Sr. at least 5 years according to the Surry County tax lists. He purchased 200 acres on the Blackwater Branch adjoining Parsons Branch on 4 Jul 1693 from Francis Regan and wife Jane.<sup>[316]</sup> On 2 Jul 1693, he witnessed the sale of a "twenty foot square house" by stepfather Joseph Richardson Sr. and mother Elizabeth Richardson to brother Thomas.<sup>[317]</sup> He sold this property to Henry Savage on 5 May 1696. By the 1697 Surry County taxables, he was no longer living with Joseph Richardson. He had either passed away or departed Surry County for some unknown destination. There is only one William Ward in the 1704 Quit Rents for Virginia and he was in Nansemond County.<sup>[318]</sup> It is not known if they are the same person.

25. John<sup>2</sup> Ward (*Thomas*<sup>1</sup>) was born in 1675<sup>[319]</sup> in Surry County and died after 30 Aug 1715 in Surry County.<sup>[320]</sup> John married Elinor (---) in 1695 in Surry County. Elinor was born in 1674 in Surry County and died before 30 Aug 1715 in Surry County.

On 20 Feb 1675/76, John was given some land at his mother's death and other items in the will of his father.<sup>[321]</sup> He witnessed a land transaction from Francis Regan to his brother William Ward for 200 acres on the Blackwater Branch adjoining Parson's Branch on 4 Jul 1693.<sup>[322]</sup> John owed money to Nicholas Pasfield on 11 Mar 1695.<sup>[323]</sup> On 3 Mar 1697, he and wife Elinor sold his inherited 100

acres of land to his brother Thomas.<sup>[324]</sup> He was in the Surry County militia in Nov 1701.<sup>[325]</sup> John purchased 100 acres on Parsons Branch from Phillip Burrow and wife Isabella recorded on 7 Mar 1703.<sup>[326]</sup> He sold this property to Richard Bennett on 20 May 1713.<sup>[327]</sup> On 30 Aug 1715, he left a will mentioning daughter Jane Ellis. Elinor was mentioned only once in the records and was deceased at the time of her husband's will.

**26.** Joseph<sup>2</sup> Richardson Jr. (*Elizabeth<sup>1</sup>*) was born in 1687<sup>[328]</sup> in Surry County and died after 29 Oct 1753 in Johnston County.<sup>[329]</sup> Joseph married **Rebecca** (---) about 1719 in Surry County. Rebecca was born in 1689 in Surry County.

On 21 Mar 1715, Joseph sued William Davidson for trespass.<sup>[330]</sup> Joseph and wife Rebecca sold 300 acres previously owned by his father to Thomas Oliver of York County on 15 Jan 1722/23.<sup>[331]</sup> He purchased from William Simms 95 acres on the north side of Sicors Swamp on 19 Apr 1728.<sup>[332]</sup> By 29 Oct 1753, Joseph had migrated to Johnston County. On that date, he sold his 95 acres on Sicors Swamp to Benjamin Hancock.<sup>[333]</sup> Rebecca was mentioned only once in the records.

**27. Joseph**<sup>3</sup> **Ward** (*Thomas*<sup>2</sup>, *Thomas*<sup>1</sup>) was born in 1695 in Surry County and died after 12 Dec 1762 in Isle of Wight County.<sup>[334]</sup> Joseph married **Elizabeth** (---) in 1718 in Isle of Wight County. Elizabeth was born in 1697 in Isle of Wight County and died after 8 May 1767 in Isle of Wight County.<sup>[335]</sup>

Joseph was mentioned in the will of grandfather Francis Raynor on 29 Sep 1716 but not in his father's will.<sup>[336]</sup> He witnessed the land transaction from William Jones to William Allen and Randall Allen of 150 acres on the First Swamp of the Blackwater River adjoining Nokes Branch on 16 Mar 1724.<sup>[337]</sup> Joseph witnessed the will of John Stevenson on 24 Feb 1728/29.<sup>[338]</sup> He was an appraiser

on the estate of Richard Jordan dated 12 Apr 1735,<sup>[339]</sup> Robert Cannon on 29 Jul 1736,<sup>[340]</sup> and John Mangum on 26 Sep 1737.<sup>[341]</sup>

Joseph was a witness to a sale from George Bell Jr. of North Carolina to Joseph Atkinson of 100 acres on 13 Oct 1742.<sup>[342]</sup> He purchased 200 acres from John Goodrich on the First Swamp of the Blackwater River adjoining Lawrence Baker, Honor Peirce, John Davis, and his own property on 11 Feb 1746/47.<sup>[343]</sup> He purchased 80 acres that was previously owned by George Crips from John Jordan on 4 Sep 1755.<sup>[344]</sup> Joseph left his will on 12 Dec 1762 and his estate was processed from 6 Sep 1766 through 7 May 1767.<sup>[345]</sup> His wife Elizabeth was given a portion of his estate.

Children from the marriage of Joseph Ward and Elizabeth (---) were:

- M i. **John<sup>4</sup> Ward** was born in 1720 in Isle of Wight County and was deceased by Sep 1774.<sup>[346]</sup>. In his father's will he received his father's manor plantation and 80 acres purchased from John Jordan on 12 Dec 1762.<sup>[347]</sup>
- M ii. **Joseph<sup>4</sup> Ward** was born in 1722 in Isle of Wight County and died after 12 Dec 1762. Joseph married **Mary** (---) about 1745. Joseph received a slave, 200 acres his father had purchased from John Goodrich, and some other items in his will on 12 Dec 1762.<sup>[348]</sup> He was deceased by 5 Oct 1775 when his wife was a neighbor to Thomas Shelly and David Jones on the First Swamp of the Blackwater.<sup>[349]</sup>
- 32 F iii. **Elizabeth<sup>4</sup> Ward** was born in 1724 in Isle of Wight County and died after 10 Apr 1786 in Isle of Wight County.
- 33 F iv. **Unity**<sup>4</sup> **Ward** was born in 1728 in Isle of Wight County and died after 12 Dec 1781 in Surry County.
  - Fv.Anne4 Ward was born in 1729 in Isle of Wight County and died before 15 Mar 1811 in<br/>Warren County. (See 6. James Maddray for information on her family.)

Thomas purchased 40 acres from uncle Charles Sims and wife Esther of Edgecombe County, North Carolina on 8 Mar 1762.<sup>[352]</sup> Lucy received a bequest in her father's will on 12 Dec 1762.

Sarah was born in 1701 in Isle of Wight County and died after 20 Jan 1738/39.

He was mentioned in the will of his father on 15 Apr 1727.<sup>[354]</sup> John left a will on 20 Jan 1738/39. Sarah was mentioned only in the will of her husband.

29. Olive<sup>3</sup> Ward (*Thomas*<sup>2</sup>, *Thomas*<sup>1</sup>) was born in 1705 in Surry County and died after 22 Mar 1784 in Isle of Wight County.<sup>[355]</sup> Olive married **Thomas Cofer**, son of **John Cofer** and **Jane** Bennett, in 1728 in Isle of Wight County. Thomas was born in 1703 in Surry County and died after 3 Nov 1783 in Isle of Wight County.<sup>[356]</sup>

On 22 Jan 1738, Thomas was an appraiser on the estate of William Braddy.<sup>[357]</sup> He also appraised the estate of Samuel Person recorded 3 Jun 1762.<sup>[358]</sup> Thomas left a will dated 3 Nov 1783. After his death, Olive sold 100 acres where she now lived to her son Jacob on 22 Mar 1784.<sup>[359]</sup> Thomas' estate was still being processed on 22 Feb 1792.<sup>[360]</sup>

**30.** Benjamin<sup>3</sup> Ward (*Thomas*<sup>2</sup>, *Thomas*<sup>1</sup>) was born in 1710 in Surry County and died before 6 Feb 1751/52 in Isle of Wight County when his estate papers were filed.<sup>[361]</sup> Benjamin married Sarah (---) in 1734 in Isle of Wight County. Sarah was born in 1712 in Isle of Wight County. Sarah married secondly Reuben Proctor, son of Jeremiah Proctor and Bridget Green, by 10 Jan

1758. Reuben Proctor was born about 1709 in Isle of Wight County and died after 1758 in Isle of Wight County.

In the will of his father on 15 Apr 1727, Benjamin received 200 acres of land where his father lived after the death of his mother.<sup>[362]</sup> He sold William Braddy 50 acres between the first and second Blackwater Swamps on 23 Apr 1743.<sup>[363]</sup> Benjamin and his brother Francis were appraisers in the estate of Thomas Deloach recorded on 7 Feb 1750.<sup>[364]</sup> Benjamin was deceased by 6 Aug 1752 when his estate was processed. Sarah was the administrator on his estate.<sup>[365]</sup>

Sarah married secondly Reuben Proctor. Reuben was in a suit with John Meacom on 6 Jul 1749.<sup>[366]</sup> He was also an appraiser on the estate of George Miller dated 2 May 1751.<sup>[367]</sup> On 10 Jan 1758, they sold 260 acres of Sarah's dower land to her nephew Thomas Ward.<sup>[368]</sup> He may be the Reuben Proctor that witnessed a sale from Jordan Thomas to Michael Smalley on 1 Jan 1760 in Halifax County, North Carolina.<sup>[369]</sup>

**31.** Francis<sup>3</sup> Ward (*Thomas*<sup>2</sup>, *Thomas*<sup>1</sup>) was born in 1711 in Surry County and died after 13 Jun 1769 in Isle of Wight County.<sup>[370]</sup> Francis married Ann (---) in 1734 in Isle of Wight County. Ann was born in 1713 in Isle of Wight County and died after 6 Nov 1783 in Isle of Wight County.<sup>[371]</sup>

Francis received 100 acres of land next to his sister Hannah and brother Benjamin on a contingency basis in the will of his father on 15 Apr 1727.<sup>[372]</sup> On 12 Mar 1746, he purchased 100 acres on west side of the First Swamp of the Blackwater from Richard Gray.<sup>[373]</sup> Francis and his brother Benjamin were appraisers in the estate of Thomas Deloach recorded 7 Feb 1750.<sup>[374]</sup> He was an appraiser on the

estate of Olive Braddy on 14 Apr 1753.<sup>[375]</sup> Francis wrote his will on 13 Jun 1769 but it was not recorded until 1 Aug 1776. His estate was processed on 4 Sep 1777<sup>[376]</sup> and 6 Nov 1783.<sup>[377]</sup>

32. Elizabeth<sup>4</sup> Ward (Joseph<sup>3</sup>, Thomas<sup>2</sup>, Thomas<sup>1</sup>) was born in 1724 in Isle of Wight County and died after 10 Apr 1786 in Isle of Wight County. Elizabeth married John Stallings about 1744 in Isle of Wight County. John was born about 1722 in Nansemond County and died after 10 Apr 1786 in Isle of Wight County.<sup>[378]</sup>

Elizabeth was only mentioned three times in the records. She received a slave in her father's will on 12 Dec 1762.<sup>[379]</sup> Elizabeth was given some of her husband's estate on 10 Apr 1786 and was made executrix. The third occasion was the sale of land on 6 Sep 1759.

John first appeared in the records when he purchased lot 31 in Smithfield from Matthew Jones on 5 Jul 1753.<sup>[380]</sup> He and wife Elizabeth sold this property to William McConnell on 6 Sep 1759.<sup>[381]</sup> On 7 Oct 1754, he bought 50 acres on the Second Swamp of the main Blackwater River from William Braddy.<sup>[382]</sup> He was an appraiser in the estate of Mary Deloach recorded 1 Jan 1756.<sup>[383]</sup> John received a payment from his father-in-law recorded on 8 May 1768.<sup>[384]</sup> John left a will dated 10 Apr 1786 and an estate on 6 Jun 1791.<sup>[385]</sup> John and Elizabeth are the parents of Joseph Stallings that married 21. Lucy Hazelwood.

**33.** Unity<sup>4</sup> Ward (Joseph<sup>3</sup>, Thomas<sup>2</sup>, Thomas<sup>1</sup>) was born in 1728 in Isle of Wight County and died after 12 Dec 1781 in Surry County. Unity married Thomas Edwards, son of Newett Edwards and wife Sarah (---), in 1752 in Surry County. Thomas was born in 1723 in Surry County and died after 12 Dec 1781 in Surry County.<sup>[386]</sup>

Like her sister Elizabeth, Unity was only mentioned twice in the records. Unity received a portion of her father's will on 12 Dec 1762.<sup>[387]</sup> She was given use of some land in the will of her husband dated 12 Dec 1781.<sup>[388]</sup>

Thomas purchased a number of properties in his lifetime. On 2 Jun 1760, he was given 90 acres of land where his father lived on Mill Swamp.<sup>[389]</sup> He purchased from his brother Ethelred and wife Jane 5 acres on the south side of Spring Branch on 15 Oct 1765.<sup>[390]</sup> He also purchased 60 acres on Griffins Branch from Dolphin Davis on 11 Mar 1773.<sup>[391]</sup> In his father's will dated 5 Nov 1760, he was given money.<sup>[392]</sup> Thomas wrote his will dated 12 Dec 1781 and a codicil on 15 Nov 1782.<sup>[393]</sup> Unity outlived her husband Thomas.

Thomas and Unity had children who married into the Maddray family. Son J'Anson married **20**. **Sarah Hazelwood** as his second spouse. In addition, son Michael married **21**. **Lucy Hazelwood** as his third spouse.
