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
EDITOR'S LETTER

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Arkansas Genealogical Society's Surname Directory Newly Published

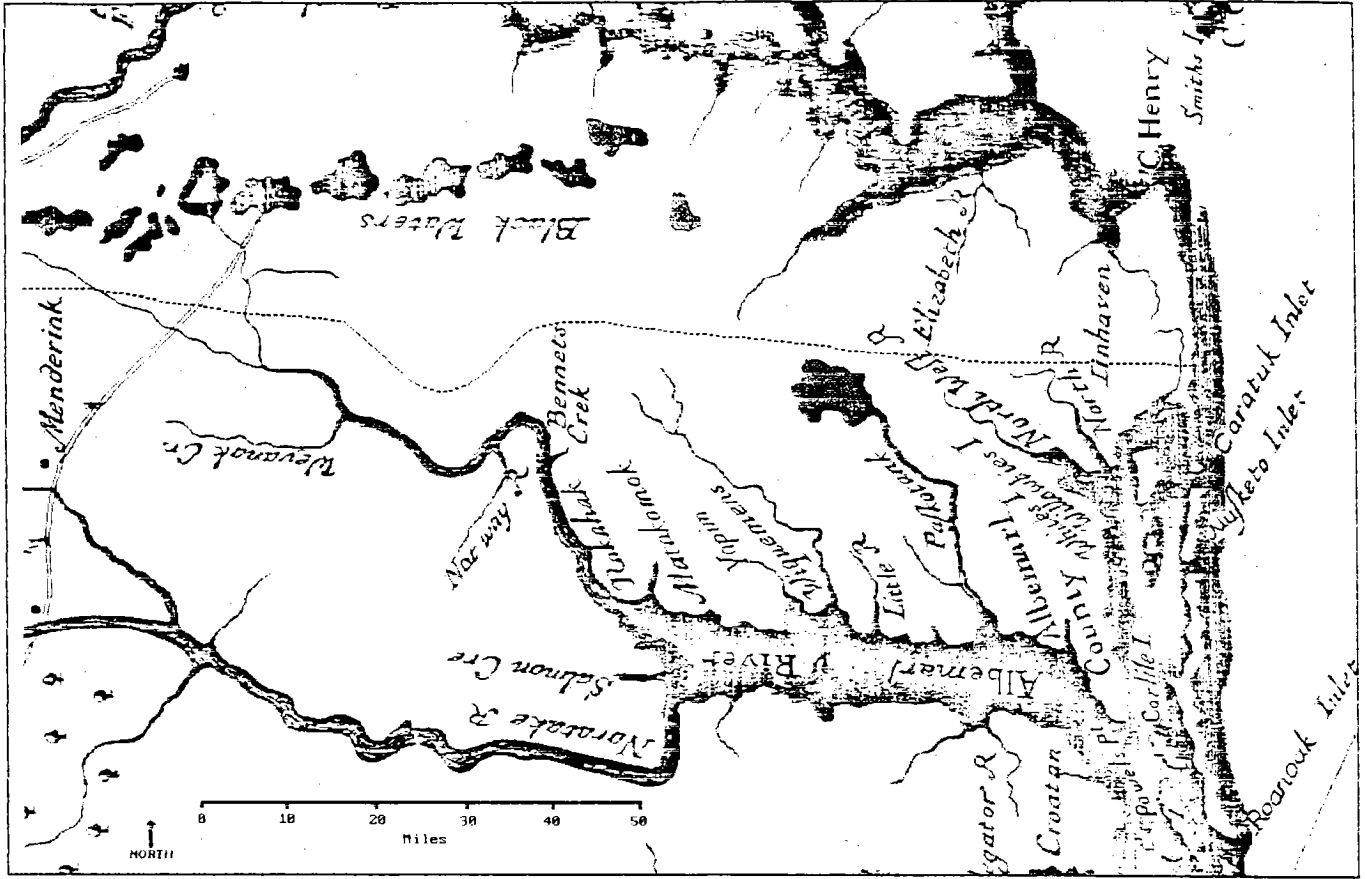

Strickland Research, Inc. Researcher Interest Directory

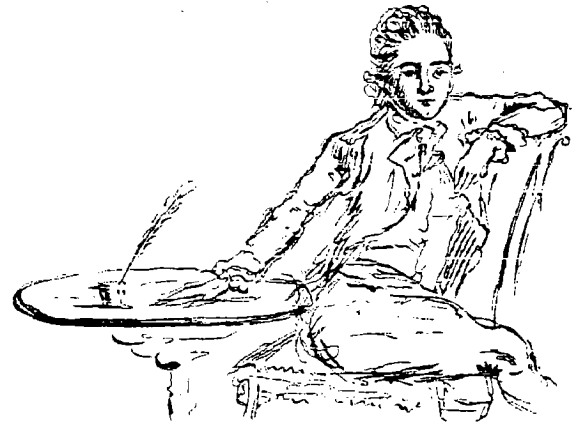

NEW YORK TORY STRICKLAND RELUCTANT HANGMAN OF BRITISH ADJUTANT GENERAL

Major John Andrè, Adjutant General of the British Army, was executed at Tappan NY at 12:00 noon on 2 Oct 1780. "His executioner was a Tory named Strickland, who resided in the Ramapo Valley. He was in confinement at Tappan, and was set at liberty on condition that he should perform the office of hangman." On the morning set for his execution, after breakfast sent to him from the table of General George Washington (as was done for him each day of his confinement), Major Andrè penned the sketch of himself shown here. At the time set for his execution he stepped into the wagon, blindfolded himself with a white handkerchief, slipped the noose over his head "and adjusted it to his neck, without the assistance of the awkward executioner." He was buried at the foot of the gallows, in a field then belonging to a Mr. Mabie. In 1831 his remains were removed to England and deposited near his monument in Westminster Abbey.

A BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF ISLE OF WIGHT COUNTY, VIRGINIA

The following is from p.315 of Historical Collection of Virginia, by Henry Howe, originally published at Charleston SC in 1845, and reprinted by Regional Publishing Co. in 1969:

"Isle of Wight was one of the eight original shires into which Virginia was divided in 1634. Its name originally was Warrosquyoake shire, which it retained three years only, when its present one was given to it. The county is 37 miles long, with a mean width of 11; it has many creeks and swamps upon its surface, and a great variety of soil, though it is generally thin and sandy. Pop. in 1840, whites 4,918, slaves 3,786, free colored 1,268; total 9,972."

REPORT OF A MILITARY ENGAGEMENT AT LEE'S MILL, VIRGINIA

This is an 1862 report of Captain M. Stanley, commanding Troup Artillery, Colonel T. R. R. Cobb's (Georgia) Legion, of the engagement at Dam No. 1 (Lee's Mill, Virginia).

"Colonel: I have the honor to report as follows in reference to the part taken by the battery under my command (Troup Artillery) in the engagement of the 16th instant at Dam No. 1:

"I had but two of my pieces in position at that point - a 6-pounder bronze field piece, under Lieutenant Pope, and a 12-pounder army howitzer, under Lieutenant Lumpkin. The former was on the right, in an earthwork of but little strength, and the latter in an earthwork somewhat stronger, on the left. Both works are unfortunately placed, being in too low a position to command the field on the opposite side of the dam. Besides my own pieces one other was there, a 24-pounder iron howitzer, belonging to Captain Jordan's battery, placed behind a work just at the dam and in a position to command scarcely more than the dam itself. Our horses, in charge of their drivers, were placed in a bottom to the right and rear of our position. One 12-pounder howitzer took no part in the engagement, because the direction of the enemy was such that it could not be fired without endangering the lives of our own men in the intrenchments (sic) at the dam. In front of the dam on the opposite side from us is a broad field, in which the ground rises gradually from the water's edge to the crest of a hill 600 or 700 yards distant, and then slopes less gradually to the woods beyond. This conformation gave the enemy an admirable position in which to place his artillery, and it indicates how unfortunate for us is the position of our works and of the dam itself.

"At about 9 a. m. on the 16th instant the enemy brought up under cover of the hill a battery of six pieces, and placed them just beyond the crest, so as to fire and yet to be a large extent protected. Judging from the balls thrown, of which a large number have been gathered up, the most of their guns were rifled. There were, however, some 12-pounder round shell and shot, indicating a smooth bore. Against this formidable array the only piece which could be used with any effect, or without endangering the lives of our men near the dam, was the smooth-bore 6-pounder, under Lieutenant Pope. For several hours did this piece maintain the unequal conflict. Captain Jordan's piece fired a few rounds, but from its disadvantageous position could not command the enemy's position, and therefore exhibited sound judgment in not prolonging its fire.

"A little before noon there was a mutual cessation of the fire. Soon after dinner the conflict was renewed. An attempt was made by the enemy's infantry to carry our rifle pits, by fording the stream in the woods some distance below the dam, and during this assault the fire of their artillery upon our works was terrific. The whole atmosphere was filled with the exploding shell and shrapnel. As before, the piece under Lieutenant Pope replied steadily and effectively, and not until the cannoneers were exhausted did the firing on our side cease. It was near night when the conflict closed.

"Though several of my men were struck with fragments of shells and spend Minie balls, and though our works were repeatedly penetrated by the enemy's shot, not one behind the works was seriously injured. One of our drivers, W. P. Meeler, a brave and faithful young man, who was with the horses, had his right leg shot off below the knee by a cannon-ball. Seven of our horses were killed in the fight, five of them by Minie balls in the engagement of the infantry.

"That the casualties among my men were so few I ascribe to the merciful providence of Almighty God. The men, with hardly an exception, exhibited great coolness and courage.

"Although the howitzer detachment took no active part in the conflict their position was exposed to a very fierce fire.

"I mention with special commendation Lieut. A. F. Pope, Gunner J. F. Dillard, and Private J. C. Strickland.

"The following also are worthy of particular notice: Sergt. R. K. Pridgeon and Privates A. C. Sorrell and George B. Atkinson.

"In conclusion I would suggest that our position at Dam No. 1 is very inferior to that of the enemy, and that in view of his powerful and numerous artillery special attention be given to that point.

"I have the honor to be, very respectfully, your obedient servant,

M. STANLEY,

Captain, Commanding Troup Artillery, Georgia Legion.

Col. T. R. R. Cobb, Commanding Georgia Legion."

REFERENCES TO OUR GEORGIA KIN IN 1817 LETTERS OF INDIAN AGENT HUGH MONTGOMERY

On 3 Jul 1817 Gov. William Rabun received a letter from Indian Agent Hugh Montgomery reporting to him the names of heads of families he had shortly before found living on the Indian lands adjacent to Jackson Co GA. A few of the persons named were: John Woodall, William Woodall, Thomas Woodall and another Woodall whose given name was unknown, and Jonathan Gray, all identified as living "on both sides of the Chatahoochee"; "above the mouth of Suaunee" were Warren Young, John Tidwell and others; "at and near the Ferry" were John Lessly, Daniel May, Caleb Mosely, Benjamin Murry, John Gothard, John Wilson and Hugh Wilson; "on Flat creek" were Simon Strickland, Sion Strickland, Irvin Strickland, Lazerus Strickland, Lewis Crow, Sion Crow and Richard Litteral; and "on and near the Chestetee" (river) were John Martin and Jesse Martin.

"Indian Agent" Montgomery, gives us pause for thought with this expression of an attitude he did not hold alone (spellings unchanged, but some punctuation added):

"There are a great many shifts which these people make to get settling on those Lands. Some Rent or Lease of Indians or Mixed Bloods, others settle Down on such place as pleases them and get some stroling vagabond Indian to live or stay with them, they Call themselves his Croppers, he is to hunt and they cultivate the Ground, they find him a Gun and amunition. They have the meat and he the skins, but it often so turns out that he has two Hoggskins for one Dearskin, and this accounts for the Frontier people loosing so many of their Hoggs as they do-- others (if possible) more Lax in their Morrels and Still Less Delicate in their taste will Kiss a Squaw for the privallage of their Land and Range, he then becomes a Landlord he has his Croppers, Tenants, and Hirelings etc. etc. thus a whole settlement claim under him, and what seems more abominable than all is that others give their Daughters to the Indian fellows for the privallage of Living in their Country themselves, of this Last and Worst Class are John Tidwell and Noah Langly. The Former has given four of his Daughters to Indian fellows for wives and the Latter two thus a Motly Race are propegating fast verry fast on the Chatahoochee and its waters.

"I should like to know how far the Individual Indians have a Right to Rent or Lease Lands, my own impressions are that Indians have not a fee simple title to any lands, that theirs is a mere occupant claim, that they are tenants at the will of the Government, the Treaty Reserves the Lands to them for their hunting grounds, it prohibits all Citizens of the U.S. or other persons from settling on them with out permits from the Agent of Indian Affairs, those people have no permits, they are not Indians altho some of them try to look and act like them, and it seems that to get footholl in the Nation by any of these ways which I have described has all the effect of taking the Indian Black Drink, it makes them inimical to every person who Does not ware a Long hunting shirt and Mockisins or a Match Coat and smell like tainted Dearskins and I think I am warranted in saying that If the Com'rs [commissioners] fail of success in the present Treaty it will be owing principlly if not entirely to the Clamours of those fellows seconded by a few of the Mixed Bloods, the Spurious product of those Disgracefull and unnatural matches."

On 24 Jul 1817 Montgomery advised that Lewis Crow, Jacob Crow, Levi Crow, Hugh Wilson, John Wilson, Erwin Strickland, Simon Strickland, Sion Strickland, Lazerus Strickland & several others who were named had either moved or were "actually removing within the settled limits of the State [GA] . . . and that William Stocker and John Lessly have permits from the agent for the Cherokee Nation" to remain therein. All of those named in this paragraph as "removing" appeared in Hall Co GA on the 1820 census except Lazarus Strickland. (Erwin Strickland on the census appeared as Irvin.)

Many of the others above mentioned appeared in 1820 either in Hall or Gwinnett counties.

INVENTORY & SALE OF JACOB STRICKLIN OF WAYNE COUNTY, TENNESSEE

OBITUARY OF COLONEL ERASMUS H. STRICKLAND

Services for D-Day Veteran Colonel Erasmus H. Strickland, 82, were held on Saturday, 15 Nov 1986. Colonel Strickland died 12 Nov 1986. Burial, with military rites, was in Capers Chapel Cemetery at Chester SC.

Born in Gilbert SC, he was a son of the late Julius E. and Carrie Harden Strickland. He received a B.A. degree from Wofford College, completing the reserve officer's training corps program. He was commissioned a 2d lieutenant in the U.S. Army Reserve. He received an M.A. degree from Columbia University and for nine years was a teacher and principal in public schools of Greensboro NC. He was a Boy Scout leader.

In 1933 Colonel Strickland entered the Civilian Conservation Corps and reached the rank of Captain by 1940. He joined the 8th Infantry Regiment, 4th Infantry Division, at Fort Benning GA in 1940 and went overseas with the regiment in 1943. He led its Third Battalion in the D-Day assault on Utah Beach in

Normandy. He remained with the regiment during the entire war in Europe and was highly decorated for gallantry and service. He brought the unit back to the United States in 1945 as its regimental commander. His decorations include the Distinguished Service Cross, Silver Star, Bronze Star, Purple Heart, French Croix de Guerre and numerous other awards and campaign medals.

After World War II, he was accepted in the regular Army and graduated from the Army War College in 1951. He was commander of the 5th Regimental Combat Team in Korea and retired from the Army due to physical disability, whereupon he moved to Columbia SC.

He was a member of the R. O. Barton Chapter, 4th Division Association; of VFW Post No. 641, Washington Street; United Methodist Church, and Capers Sunday school class.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Julia Potts Strickland; a son, E. Harden Strickland, Jr., of Valley Center CA; granddaughters Susan and Marcia Strickland, also of Valley Center; and nieces and nephews.

Jul 1870 AL (parents both born GA), and three of their four living children (of seven born): Ruth, b. 1892 Indian Territory (per 1900 soundex); Lobia (f.), b. ca. 1902 OK; and William T., b. ca 1907 OK. On the 1900 soundex, the family was listed in the Cherokee Nation of Indian Territory (vol. 5, E.D. 45, sheet 3, line 94) with boarder Thomas Reeves, but under the name Bowling Strickland, age 31, b. Jan 1869 TN, & Missouri's birthplace was TN. Another daughter, Mary, b. 1886 TN, was then in the household.

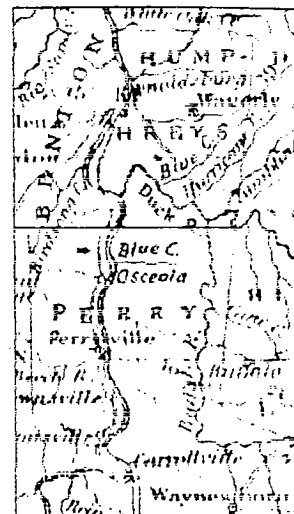
STRICKLAND Mrs. Lily Carter Thurman, 1002 Bay Oaks Road, Houston TX 77008: If

Mrs. Helen Gomer Schluter, 3800 Haltom Road, Fort Worth TX 76117, copied the Bible records of Mathew Noah Strickland, b. 31 Oct 1849 at East Pendleton LA, d. 4 Dec 1932 at Fort Worth, Tarrant Co TX (bur. 6 Dec 1932 at Bronson Cemetery, Sabine Co TX), son of Noah S. Strickland. Mathew Noah's wife was Harriot Ann Martin, b. 29 Jan 1852, d. 19 Jul 1915, daughter of Thomas J. Martin and Rebecca Watkins. Mathew Noah's & Harriot Ann's children were: James Thomas, b. 29 May 1873, d. 28 Nov 1883; Clinton, b. 22 Mar 1874, d. 29 Mar 1874; Mary Elizabeth, b. 17 Feb 1878, m. 28 Mar 1907 to Charlie Stanburg; Robert Lee, b. 29 May 1880, m. 9 Oct 1906 to Essie Strickland (1st cousin); Lilly Ola, b. 5 Nov 1882, m. 29 Dec 1908 to Fred R. Lawrence; George Franklin, b. 25 Sep 1885, m. 31 Oct 1914 to Minnie _____, and d. 7 Nov 1973; Emily Ida, b. 5 Mar 1888, m. 16 Mar 1908 to Estus Urrey; Dr. William Marvin, b. 9 Jul 1890, m. 28 Mar 1920 to Alma Strickland, & d. 9 Feb 1957 (he had the family Bible); Mattie Bell, b. 18 Oct 1892, m. 14 Apr 1912 to Rugely Zulla Sheffield; and Fannie Mae, b. 30 Jun 1895, m. 1 Feb 1920 to Ned Fuller (resided in Carlsbad NM). Redmond B. Strickland, who lived in Precinct 1 of Sabine Co TX on the 1900 census (when Mathew Noah was in Precinct 3), was the son of William Strickland, the brother of Matthew Noah. Redmond d. in 1903 from typhoid fever. At one time a third of the people in Sabine County were descendants of Solomon & Amy Pace Strickland through their daughter Mary who m. William Carter and their son Henry who m. Ruth Thompson. (Nettie Jones Denby and I added our knowledge and Sabine Co TX records to piece together this record.)

STRICKLAND Jeanne Mead, 28 Orchard Drive, Groton CT 06340: I am still trying to
 FAIN find out who are the parents of Reuben Jefferson Strickland, b. ca. 1780 NC, d. 9 May 1859 at Bainbridge, Decatur Co GA. He married Clara Fain, daughter of Thomas Fain and Mary Parramore, on 11 Dec 1828 in GA. They were members of a very early Primitive Baptist Church at Fainville, south of Faceville, in southern Decatur Co GA. I have a copy of the will written by Reuben Jefferson Strickland (given by Sheila R. Vertrees) of Cornelius OR). It listed Clara as his wife, and four children: Mathew M. Strickland, Thomas J. Strickland, Greenberry Strickland, and Lucretia Pent. His two sons, Thomas J. and Greenberry, were appointed as his executors. The will was dated 17 Feb 1859. I have been led to believe Reuben J. Strickland was married at least three times. This will has given me doubts in this regard. Thank you for any help you can give on this.

STRICKLAND May K. Williams, 6161 Memorial Highway #2215, Tampa FL 33615: I would like to contact descendants of Revolutionary War veteran David Strickland, b. 1759 CT. His wife was named Mary. He had a land grant in AR in 1821. I descend from his elder son John who stayed in MO when family moved to AR and TX.

STRICKLAND Robert C. Stricklin, POB 1931, Dallas TX 75221-1931 (or Route 1, Box 539, Warrenton OR 97146):
 GARRETT CORRECTION/AMPLIFICATION: In a query I placed
 SIMMONS in the previous issue, involving a deed dated 4
 MOORE Jun 1810 from Richard Simmons of Humphreys Co

TN to James Garret of the same county, of 50 acres in the 1st District on the west side of the north fork of Blue Creek, witnessed by John Moore and Elihu Strickland, I assumed the Blue Creek mentioned was the one that is a tributary on the north side of the Duck River near its mouth. I since found on Thomas Copperthwait & Co.'s 1850 "A New Map of Tennessee" in Perry Co another Blue Creek, about 10 miles south of the first, that empties directly into the Tennessee River. This western area of Perry Co in 1810 was a part of Humphreys Co (per the William Thorndale/William Dollarhide Map Guide to the U.S. Federal Censuses, 1790-1920. I do not spot this second Blue Creek on present-day maps, but the creeks in that approximate location are now referred to as Tom's Creek & Lick Creek (both with forks) and to their north Roan Creek and Crooked Creek (that do not). As there were Stricklands (under every spelling) in Perry County from its early records, it is more likely that this second Blue Creek (the name of which appears to have been changed later) is the one referred to in the Simmons-Garret deed than the one to the north near Waverly on the Duck River. (Incidentally, the 1850 Copperthwait map shows Perry Co on both sides of the Tennessee River, when in fact Decatur Co had been formed in 1845 of the portion of Perry Co west of the river, and a narrow strip taken from Henderson County along its west boundary.)



STRICKLIN Robert C. Stricklin, POB 1931, Dallas TX 75221-1931 (or Route 1,
 STRICKLAND Box 539, Warrenton OR 97146): On the 1830 Wayne Co TN census ap-
 GOFORTH pears a "Widow Strickland" age 50-60 heading a household including
 DICKSON two other females ages 15-20 and 20-30, and two males 5-10 and 15-
 DIXON 20. Two households away on both sides are a William Goforth and a
 BLACKWELL Z. Goforth. On p.73 of the 1840 census of Wayne Co TN a Nancy
 EDMONDS Stricklin appears next to a "Nancy Stricklin, Jr." and a James
 STOUT Dickson. On the following page appear William Goforth and Zachariah
 HENDERSON Goforth, Jr. Is the elder Nancy of these the same Nancy Stricklin
 CABLE b. VA who appears at age 82 on the 1850 census of neighboring
Decatur Co TN (in whose household my GGF William Harrison Stricklin
appeared at age 6)? James E. Bell states on p.30 of his 1986 history of Reynolds Co
MO that Able and Jane Goforth Stricklin went to Black River (in Reynolds Co MO) in 1829
from Fish Rock Creek VA with six sons and three daughters, including in part John, who
m. Nancy Blackwell on 6 May 1830, Abigail, who m. Willis Edmonds 20 Nov 1831, William,
who m. Rachel Stout 5 Dec 1833, Abial, who m. Isabella Henderson 27 Mar 1834, Henry,
who m. Jane Hurt 31 Dec 1835, and Rachel, who m. Henry Cable on 24 Jan 1839. Bell lists
Thomas Stricklin b. 31 Mar 1806, whose wife was named Cynthia, as another of their
sons. Is there a close link between Nancy Strickland/lin of Wayne County TN and her
neighbor Goforths and those of Fish Rock Creek VA? Some of the family of Thomas
Strickland, s/o Stephen Strickland of Perry Co TN, resided in the Dixon community in
Hunt Co TX. Any more than coincidence that a James Dickson household was next to Nancy
Stricklin's 1840 Wayne Co TN? The overlapping name patterns lead to a presumption of
kinship between the John Stricklin household next to 82 year old Nancy Stricklin on
the 1850 Decatur Co TN census and that of Stephen Strickland in Perry Co TN, directly
across the Tennessee River.

STRICKLAND Kathleen S. Bell, 1907 Hillman, Conway AR 72032: I have come up with
 ADAMS two Stricklands I can't place with my family, but I feel that
 somehow they belong. On the 1850 census in Pope Co AR, dwelling
 #336, is James Strickland, a farmer, age 64, b. TN, with Naomi, age 52, b. TN. He is
 in the same area as my W. W. Strickland, son of Zachariah Strickland, son of Frederick
 Strickland. We have lots of James Stricklands, so I have no idea where to begin with
 him. But with a wife whose name is Naomi, it just might be possible to place them.
 The other unidentified person is Louet Strickland, age 70 on the 1880 census in Pope
 Co AR, listed as a boarder in the household of Robert N. Adams, whose wife was Winnie
 Elizabeth Strickland, whose father was Zachariah Matt, son of Zachariah, son of
 Frederick. Louet Strickland, age 70 on the 1880 census, was born TN, with parents born
 in KY. She just appears and then she is gone. There is no cemetery record of her.
 In 1810, when she was born, Zachariah Strickland was listed in the Warren Co KY census.
 There has to be a connection, but I can't find it. I really would like any information
 on them that I can get.
