County of Washington State of North Carolina

now Tennessee he enlisted in the Service
of the then United Colonies for two years

in a Company Commanded by Captain

James Knox in the 9th Virginia

regiment Commanded by Colonel Chulera

Chulera afterwards General Chulera ^{was killed}
and was ^{at Valley Forge} ^{by General Mifflin}

which two years he faithfully served and

some time in the fall of the year 1779 in the
County before named having returned to his

place of residence and served several times
against the Indians he enlisted again ^{with} the

Service of the United States for three years
in a Company of the 9th Virginia regi-

ment Commanded by Colonel George Matthews

The company he was in in Colonel Matthews
Regiment was commanded by Captain
Berry that he faithfully served the United
States said three years for which he enlisted and
was discharged at Valley Forge by General
Cruikshank both of which discharges
are by accident lost that he was in the
Battles of Monmouth Germantown
and the White Plains that he has no other
evidence now in his power of his said
service, ^{other} than his own oath that he
never was a Pensioner of the United States
or any State for said service and hereby
relinquishes to the United States all claim
of a Pension except under the provision
of the before recited act that he is in
credent circumstances and stands in need

of the assistance of his country for support

 provide for certain persons engaged in
 the said war & to the service of the United
 States in the Revolutionary war passed
 on the 18th day of March 1818 & that
 I have not nor has any person for me
 any property or secret contracts or debts
 due to me nor have I any income
 other than what is contained in the schedule
 hereto annexed & by me subscribed.

Sir

I send you in this package the Declaration in the case of Mrs Mary the son & heir of Rezinah Mary whose declaration was filed some years ago. The Commissioner of Pensions wrote me not long ago that "yours was sufficient evidence to place her under the act of 1838 but not the act of 1836. I supposed from that, that I need not produce any ~~other~~ testimony, more than a declaration which he required to be filed claiming the benefit of the act you July 1838. This I have done, and as the case has lay so long and is now complete, I hope that it will be acted on immediately.

If there is anything more wanted I would like to know it as those persons having cognizance of such things as post dying. I enclose the Commissioner's letter

On this 16th day of April One thousand eight hundred and fifty one; personally appeared before the Court of Pleas and Quarter Sessions for said County John Maney a resident in said County and State aged sixty seven years, who being first duly sworn according to Law doth on his oath make the following Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the act of Congress passed July 7th 1838, entitled "An act granting half pay and Pensions to certain Widows" that he is the legitimate child of one Keziah and Martin Maney; that his Mother Keziah Maney was the widow of Martin Maney who was a soldier in the Revolutionary War, and who was placed on the Pension list Rolls of the N. Carolina Agency at the rate of eight Dollars per Month, and who drew up to the fifteenth day of April. A. D. One thousand Eight hundred and thirty; on which day said Martin Maney died, leaving his widow Keziah still alive. Deponent further states, that his Mother Keziah Maney afterwards made application for a Pension, under the act passed the 27th day of July 1836, but which claim was rejected, that the Attorney who attended to it for her, was one Silvester Bettes, and that she was sworn to her Declaration in open Court, and with that Declaration she sent

the proof of her marriage, and that it was considered sufficient to place her under the act which he now claims but not of that of 1836. He further says that he does not know of any additional evidence as to the marriage and for that reason, he relies entirely on the proof which has already been produced, (with the former Declaration) Deponent further states that the following are the names of all the children, that are now living, viz; John Maney the applicant as above stated, James Maney, William Maney, and Nancy Mielcoff wife of Absolum Mielcoff who is two years older than the aforementioned John Maney.

He further states that, he cannot say when the marriage took place, but that it took place previous to the first day of January one thousand ~~eight hundred~~ and ninety four viz; at the time mentioned in the former Declaration: That, his mother Keziah Maney was never married after the death of Martin, her husband, and that she died on the 20th day of December A.D. one thousand eight hundred and forty nine, as will more fully appear, by reference to the proof herewith presented.

red & forty three personally appeared before the Court afores-
aid ^{her} Rejiah Mary, a resident of the County & State afores-
aid, aged Eighty Years, who being first duly sworn
according to Law doth on her oath make the follow-
ing declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the
provisions made by the act of Congress passed July 4th
1836. —

That she is the widow of Martin
Mary late Revolutionary pensioner dec^d of the County
of Buncomb N^c Carolina who was a private Soldier in the
Virginia Cont-Line in the War of the Revolution, and
was allowed a pension by the United States of \$96 doll
ars a year while living in the County of Blount East
Tennessee, which pension was afterwards transferred
to Buncomb County N^c Carolina in the Year of 1830.


She further declared that she was married to
the said Martin Mary, near Jonesboro East Tennessee
(now called) in the month of September, and in the Year of
(1781) one thousand seven hundred & Eighty-one, and that
her husband the aforesaid Martin Mary died on the
15th day of April, in the year of (1830) Eighteen hundred &
thirty, and that she has remained a widow ever since
that period as will more fully appear by reference to
the proof hereto annexed

She further declared that she was married
to her said husband the aforesaid Martin Mary prior
to the expiration of the last period of his services, in
the War of the Revolution viz that her said husband was
in the Army at the time she was married to him, he
was one of a Company of Cavalry that were stationed at
the place called Campells Station which is on the Water

- of Big Limestone broke. Which service he soon left after
we were married. The next service that her said husband
was called into was in the Summer of the Year of 1782
Seventeen hundred & eighty two the Summer following their
marriage her said husband Martin Mabry was drafted
for a Tour of Service under Capt James Wilson & Col Sur-
ier to go out onto Tennessee River against the Indians
and Tories Which tour of Service he performed & was
discharged & came home to me at which time she was a
staying with her Mother near Jonesboro Tenn. The above
was a Tour of three months she thinks. Furthermore
that her said husband was out frequently after the
above tour as a scout but did not perform any reg-
ular tour of Service

Dear Sir:

Reference is made to your request for information in regard to Martin Maney who served in the 8th Virginia Regiment, Revolutionary War.

The data which follow were obtained from papers on file in claim for pension, W. 7398, based upon the military service of Martin Maney in the Revolutionary War.

The date and place of birth of Martin Maney were not given, nor were the names of his parents stated.

While residing in Washington County, North Carolina (which was later Tennessee) Martin Maney enlisted at the "Long Island of Holston", December 4, 1775, served as a private in Captain James Knox's company, Colonel Muhlenburg's 8th Virginia regiment, he was in the battles of White Plains and Germantown, length of service two years. At the expiration of his service, he enlisted and served in Captains Berry's and Wood's companies, Colonel George Matthews' 9th Virginia regiment, was in the battle of Monmouth, length of this service three years. He enlisted in the summer of 1782, served three months in Captain James Wilson's company, Colonel John Sevier's North Carolina regiment, in pursuit of Indians and Tories. He was, also, out in several scouting expeditions, officers' names not given.

He was allowed pension on his application

executed July 31, 1818, at which time he was aged about sixty-nine years, and living in Elount County, Tennessee.

The soldier, Martin Maney, died April 15, 1830 in Buncombe County, North Carolina.

Martin Maney married in the month of September, 1781, near Jonesboro, Washington County, "East Tennessee", Keziah Vann or Van. The date and place of her birth and names of her parents were not given; about the time of her marriage her parents were living near Jonesboro.

The widow, Keziah Maney, applied for pension October 11, 1843, then aged eighty years, and a resident of Yancey County, North Carolina. The pension was allowed.

The widow died December 20, 1849 in Yancey County, North Carolina.

The following are the names of the children of Martin Maney, and his wife, Keziah, as shown in the claim:

Reference was made in 1821 to a son aged seventeen years; his name was not designated.

The following children survived Keziah Maney, their mother—John Maney a resident of Yancey County, North Carolina in 1851; William Maney; James Maney; and Nancy Medcalf, wife of Absolum Medcalf or Midoalf, of Yancey County, North Carolina.

The papers on file in this claim contain no

further discernible data relative to family.

The application for headstone for Martin Maney is returned herewith, also a letter addressed to your ~~your~~ office from M. L. Maney, 300 Brucemont Circle, West Asheville, North Carolina.
